A Time for Everything

Lately I have found myself thinking about this newsletter article and what to share with all of you. Sometimes I have found this to be a daunting task and other times, I'm thinking, "Oh Heck, just write!"

I've been reflecting on Ecclesiastes 3:1-8:
For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven. A time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted; a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance; a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing; a time to seek, a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to throw away; a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak; a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace.

Let me share with you why . . . my sister, Mary, died of Lou Gehrig's (ALS) disease in October of 2000. At her memorial service I read this from Ecclesiastes. When I committed her ashes I again read from Ecclesiastes. It was a time to break down, weep and a time to laugh, mourn, gather, speak and love. Mary loved these verses too. She was also very fond of the song by the Byrds called "Turn, Turn,

Turn," which we played at her memorial service.

In September 2007 our son David proposed to Katlyn Griese. (They will marry on June 28, 2008 in Anchorage, Alaska.) Again I reflected on Ecclesiastes. It is a time for joy, and will be a time to dance, a time to weep, a time to embrace, a time to love. When each of our sons graduated from college (David, December 2006; Paul August 2007) again Ecclesiastes came into my mind, a time to

build up, laugh, weep, (for those that know me, weeping is a constant in celebration or remembrance!)

I also found these days a time to keep silent, grieve and, funny as it may sound, a time to look forward to embracing new members to our staff which lent itself to a time to build up.

Now we are in the season of Lent. Ecclesiastes, it seems, is very appropriate to reflect on. During Lent, I have taken the advice of our dear Pastor Pete who one Lenten season let me in on something he did. He added something to his life instead of taking away. He encouraged me to give it a try (he knew me well!) I now look forward to Lent, and the discipline that Pete encouraged me to try . . .

We are in an exciting time in the church. Once in every generation a new core worship resource appears: a new treasury of worship, prayer, and song to help the church renew its worship life. Later this year we will reach one of those moments in our church's history: *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* will be available for us to use in our worship at OSLC. Our worship committee and church council have been exploring this new resource and have adopted a timeline to begin gradually introducing the *ELW* to our congregation.

Evangelical Lutheran Worship is the result of a five-year process during which Lutheran congregations all across North America were invited to test new worship materials and provide feedback to help build the best worship resources for the whole church. You have perhaps seen this cranberry-colored volume while visiting other churches. These resources have truly been prepared by the whole church, for the whole church. They reflect the riches of our past, the gifts of the present, and the hope that we have for the future of God's church.

This comprehensive book of worship will be the centerpiece of a diverse, faithful, and grace-filled family of resources. It represents the full breadth of the church, including much that Lutheran churches know and cherish from existing resources, while incorporating new liturgies, new hymns, and new texts—a prayer resource for worship, at home, and throughout one's journey of faith.

This spring we will begin introducing *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* at OSLC. During that time, we will also be taking special offerings during Lent and Easter to help us with the purchase of these new resources, while also providing opportunities for members to donate books in memory or honor of a loved one. In addition, dedicated memorial funds have already been given to OSLC for the specific purpose of purchasing this new resource.

As the primary worship book of the ELCA [and ELCIC], *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* will con-

tribute to the sense that all congregations are connected. Our worship committee and church council hope you will find this new book of worship an enriching part of our lives of faith at OSLC. The worship committee and musical ensembles at OSLC will be presenting opportunities for our congregation to become more familiar with this resource, and we all will no doubt rely on the past experiences of Pastor Ryan who introduced the *ELW* at St. Paul's Lutheran in Wilton, WI, where he previously served!

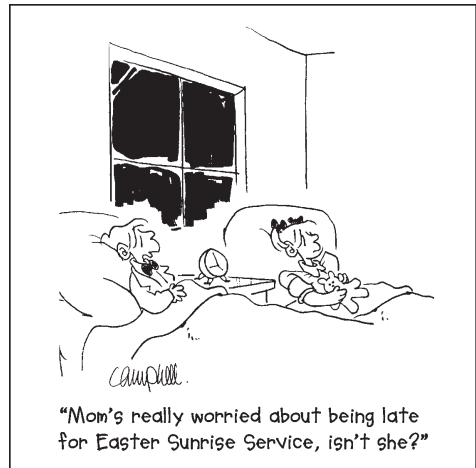
Special Handbell Music to be Featured on Palm Sunday *The Passion Prophecy*

The composer added her emotional purpose while writing to describe what possible feelings Christ may have had during the crucifixion. Paying Attention and Keeping Our Focus

Jesus tells us not to worry about what we will eat or drink, or about our body and what we will wear. Keep the focus on the main thing, he urges us: "Seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."

How do we begin to pay attention to God so he can keep us moving in the right direction?

The answer will be slightly different for each of us, but spiritual growth research gives us a list of five behaviors that help us focus on God—behaviors so simple that we sometimes do not see how powerful they are.

1. **Worship** is one of those behaviors.
2. **Prayer** is another of those ways we pay attention to God.
3. **Fellowship**, working, playing, and meeting with other Christians—is another way to pay attention to God. (Peer relationships exert a powerful life-shaping force among teenagers, but are equally powerful among adults.)
4. **Bible study** is another power-filled way to focus on God.
5. **Financial giving** is another. Many people report that financial giving is a priority that allows God to remold the other priorities of their lives.

Which of these five is the most important cause of spiritual growth? The answer is *all of them are important*.

Which one of the five do you most need to add to your life right now?

Treasurer's Report January 2007

We are 7 months (31 Sundays or 59%) through our year.

We have received YTD - (60% of operations budget) \$314,100.

Which includes rent received YTD - \$6,000.

We have spent YTD - (56% of operations budget) \$306,800.

We have **received** more than spent YTD - \$7,300.

We are ahead YTD operations budget giving by \$10,000.

We have had GTS II giving YTD - \$17,800.

We have had YTD GTS II submitted expenses of \$15,700. (Outstanding GTS II expenses are still to be submitted.)

YTD designated funds giving is \$33,200.

Note: Special gift of \$21,000 received in September is included in YTD income. Income numbers higher because of this.

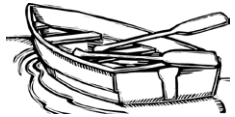
