Several counselors would link arms to form the "body," then each person would describe what part of the body they were and why they were the most important. It went

- "I am the heart. I never stop working to pump blood through your veins. The body couldn't survive without me, so clearly I am the most important!"

This would continue until they got to the last person: the Big Toe. The Body wasn't able to go anywhere until it welcomed back the Big Toe. The point of the skit, of course, is that we all have gifts to contribute, no matter how unimportant they may seem at first glance.

Last summer, I wanted to build a sand play table for my kids, but I didn't know how to use my circular saw. I desperately wished my dad could show me, but he lives in Wisconsin and I didn't want to wait the several months before he visited again. Like any good millennial, I watched a YouTube video and decided to go for it. It was terrifying. I was sure I was going to cut off a finger or something. I wanted somebody to walk with me and guide me through the process and I suspect several of you would have been willing and able.

What gifts do you have? Could you greet and welcome a visitor or someone you don't know? Could you help someone get the pictures off of their phone and onto their computer? Could you bring in food for coffee hour? Could you help the Garden Angels clean up someone's yard? Could you knit or crochet a prayer shawl? Could you play Go Fish with or read a book to one of the kids at church? Could you give a ride to someone who doesn't drive, whether it's to church or simply running errands? Could you share a meal with someone? Like the Big Toe, we are all valued members of the body of Christ. What do you have to offer?

Engaging the Spiritual Practices of Lent and the Three Days

Compassion House:

Needed: a good reliable used car for mother of three living in Compassion House. Her car was totaled in a car accident a few months ago. Also needed are funds to help with the purchase of this used car. Compassion House is a local Christian Agency that provides transitional housing for families who are leaving domestic violence situations.

Report on Safe Parking:

During the very coldest days of December we had no one in safe parking. All were able to find shelter elsewhere at least for the very worst nights. Unfortunately, at least two of our ladies got very ill during this time. One is still staying with a friend while she completes her third round of antibiotics.

One of our ladies met with me about two weeks ago and I noticed her ankles were very swollen. When I commented that they looked dangerously swollen and I thought she should go to the ER, she followed my recommendation. She was treated for very low potassium levels which effected her heart. She was admitted to ICU where she spent three days. After that she was placed in a regular hospital room for two more days. She is well now and back in the parking lot. Due to the generosity of our congregation, I have been able to give her personal hygiene products and a sleeping bag. She told me today that she has a job interview for a position that will pay well later this week.

We have a new lady that has just come to our parking lot. She is highly educated and has held professional positions in the past. Due to several traumatic experiences she is now reduced to living in her car.

Please pray for all of our ladies that each would receive the support and counsel that they need to get back on their feet and that they would find gainful employment and housing.

Dear Friends,

It is my joy to be able to serve the Office of Bishop precisely because I get to witness over and over again the generosity and continuing acts of grace that happen across the territory of our Synod.

Our Lutheran Churches continue to be a great value to the communities in which they are placed. Lutherans believe in caring for the most vulnerable in our neighborhoods. Our churches are often the first to step up when it comes to feeding, sheltering, resettling immigrants, and responding to crisis.

This is not by accident. It happens because we have been formed and shaped by grace which frees us to share with others the love and forgiveness we have first known.

I want to remind you that being part of a faith community makes a real difference in how a person is formed. Robert Putman (Harvard) and David Campbell (Notre Dame) have researched the impact that a faith community has. Here are a few of their findings:

Three or four times more likely to be involved in their community

- Vote in local elections
- Attend public meetings
- Donate time and money
- Faith-formed people in general are "nicer"
- Helping strangers and neighbors
- Let others cut in front of them
- Give money to panhandlers

The most inspiring part of their research is they discovered the motivation behind these positive behaviors is not because they are trying to secure a place in heaven or out of fear of divine judgment. The behavior is directly linked to their sense of belonging to a community. Put more simply the friendships they develop at church.

Many of our churches will soon be holding their Annual Meetings. Please remind your people of how valuable they are to one another and to the whole community. We often make a much greater difference than we are aware of.

In closing, I want to thank you for the generosity of your gifts in support of the Synod and ELCA. Your gifts make it possible for us to support one another and to literally reach around the world in sharing the love of Christ with others.
