Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you. ~Isaiah 60:1

Are you someone who likes to make new year resolutions? About the time I entered high school my parents decided making new year resolutions was a good way to help me become "goal orientated." They use to tell me, "New year... new start." Not surprising, most years, by the third week of January I had completely forgotten about them. I was never one of those people who did a great job setting goals for the sake of setting goals. I guess I was never convinced, or never understood the purpose, of setting goals each year just for the sake of setting goals. Shouldn't they lead somewhere? Just because it's a new year doesn't mean the world is radically changed?

A few years ago, I came across a goal setting tool called a V2MOM. It stands for Vision, Values, Methods, Obstacles, and Metrics. It's a goal setting tool that isn't predicated on the idea that goal setting is for the sake of goal setting. It's predicated on the idea that goals should be flexible enough to be adjusted, but concrete enough to get you to an end point (vision). Not surprisingly I connected with this tool almost immediately. I used it during my time at Saint Andrew's Lutheran Church to help redirect the vision of their Christian Education ministry, and then have used it here at OSLC to help grow our vision as we look toward the future together and what God has instore for us.

By now many of you are familiar with our vision: To be a community that fearlessly follows Jesus to love God's people. But do you know the values that drive all of the decisions council makes? As we begin this new year, I'd like to share with you the core values that your council has arrived at, and uses as they look to some of the changes that have, and will continue to take place. If you have any questions about them please reach out to me.

OSLC Core Values:

1) Be accessible:

One of the most amazing things about Jesus was how accessible he was to the people he encountered. He didn't keep to himself, or only hangout with the movers and shakers in society. Jesus hung out with regular people like you and I. The scriptures tell of Jesus eating with 5,000 (Luke 9:10-17), hanging out with tax collectors and sinners (Mark 2:13-17), and opening the doors to all who would listen (Matthew 22:1-14). At OSLC we try and be accessible in all that we do. From how you are greeted when you arrive on Sunday morning, to the way we worship, and how we teach and preach, everything is geared towards your growth as a disciple of Jesus Christ.

2) Be faithful to God's word:

There are many fads which seem to come and go these days. Placing our faith in any one of them can be misleading and dangerous. At OSLC we know what the prophet Isaiah said is true, the Word of God stands forever (Isaiah 40:8), and so our community strides to be faithful to God's Word. Are we perfect? No, as a matter of fact we are far from it, and that's why we value it so much (Romans 3:23-24). However, we are committed to being faithful to God's word knowing and understanding it takes time, and applying it to our lives takes patience.

3) Be responsive to God's call:

Disciples are followers of Christ. They are men and women, girls and boys who have heard God's commission and respond to it (Matthew 28:16-20). At OSLC we think it's important to not just know what we believe, but also to respond to God's call (James 4:14-26).

4) Be open to and inconvenienced by the Holy Spirit:

When God sent the Holy Spirit it was to help us remember all that Jesus said (John 14:26). It was to be a continual reminder to Christ's disciples of where God is calling. This is not easy. Often where God calls is not where we want to go. Think about Moses for a moment. When God called him to led the Israelites out of Egypt his first response wasn't "of course!" rather, he asked God "Why me?" (Exodus 3:11). At OSLC we strive to be open to the Holy Spirit.

5) Trusting relationships:

The primary metaphor for the church in the New Testament is the body of Christ. The church isn't an individual, it's a group of people who come together and form the church. That's why Paul stresses building one another up in the community (1 Thessalonians 5:11). Key to this is the formation of trusting relationships. At OSLC we know there are a lot of people who do not attend church, or join a church community, because trust has been broken. We don't want that to be a barrier, so we work hard at building trusting relationships.

Social Concerns Corner Submitted by Kate Gagnon

December was the busiest month yet for the Social Concerns Committee.

Thank you to all who donated gift cards at the Giving Tree. We were able to give them to members of the church who were in need, our Safe Parking person (only one at this time), Vine Maple Place, Compassion House, and some we will keep to be distributed through the year as needed.

Thanks to Judi Case, who did a wonderful job writing the Request for Proposal (RFP), the sub committee began its work to find the social service agency that will be the best fit for a contract to utilize our old preschool space. The RFP was released December 18th to the public. The deadline for receiving the completed RFPs back is February 2nd. At that time the subcommittee will begin the assessments and work to identify the best agency to utilize the space. Members of the subcommittee are: Diane Fatland, Connie Fletcher, Mark Cron, Kate Gagnon, Judi Case and Don Robertson. We will work very hard to keep the congregation apprised of our progress.

In order to get the preschool room ready for its new purpose, we will be offering the opportunity for church members and friends to visit the preschool and take items that they can use. The open house for this purpose will be on January 7th after church services. After that date the committee will see what is left and determine whether there is enough to hold a garage sale or just donate the remainder to charity. We will be looking for people who can help with heavy lifting of furniture and boxes. We may need trucks to haul the furniture as well.

On December 18th and 19th OSLC was once again very involved in the Lunch for the Break Program. Over 400 children were served. This program, a joint venture with the Issaquah Schools, the Issaquah Library and the Issaquah Food and Clothing Bank, collects and distributes food to school age children, most of whom receive free and reduced lunches at school on school days. During breaks from school these families struggle to provide enough food. On December 19th families were able to pick up boxes of food, gift cards to QFC, and the children were able to choose books to take home donated by the library. Volunteers from Passage Point came to help us pack boxes and distribute them. A huge thank you to church members who also helped.

Last fall we completed a series of events to learn more about Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs). We heard Don Burnett from Passage Point preach followed by a discussion about ACEs. We showed the movie Paper Tigers about how one Washington School district is working with ACEs teens to help them complete high school. We had speakers from Olive Crest, Compassion House, and VOICE Mentoring come and tell us about their programs. Finally on December 10th we met to discuss what the church is being led to do to help this population of children. While no family from the church emerged that felt they could take on the responsibility of providing a temporary foster home for children, there seemed to be a sense that many congregational members felt that we want to support the Olive Crest Program. This support could take many forms. The most evident is being a congregation that can provide "backup" to a family from another church that is providing temporary foster care. At future meetings we can pursue this idea further.

As always, the committee is open to having new member join us. Please let me know if you have interest in doing so.



Global Mission Committee

Sip Boldy! (#sipboldy)

Coffee, conversation and pastries are integral parts of OSLC Sunday morning hospitality. In fact, we would hardly be considered Lutheran if there wasn't, at the very least, coffee available for Sunday fellowship.

With the introduction of coffee purchased through the Lutheran World Relief (LWR) Farmers Market (lwrfarmersmarket.org) OSLC deliciously extends its commitment to the support of global mission initiatives.

Throughout the developing world, millions of smallholder farmers daily struggle to increase their incomes and improve their livelihoods. Among these smallholders are independent coffee producers, who face considerable obstacles and challenges in maximizing their crop yield and capturing its full value in the marketplace.

To address these challenges, LWR uses an agricultural value chain approach to promote sustainable development in the communities of smallholder farmers. The value chain includes interventions designed to increase the proportion of benefits that reaches independent coffee farmers. For example, LWR builds coffee producers' capacity in organic farming and the production of organic fertilizers and bio-pest control as low-cost methods to improve the coffee growing environment.

OSLC is an integral component of the LWR value chain. When we purchase coffee through the LWR farmers market, we provide vitally needed funds that helps sustain, small, indigenous coffee producers in the developing world.

The next cup of coffee you sip, do so knowing that you are actively participating in OSLC's global mission efforts through LWR. Sip boldly (#sipboldly) at church and purchase online at lwefarmersmarket.org.

Peru Scholarships—2018 and Beyond

In January 2015, OSLC began a post-secondary scholarship program in support of three young women of Chiclayo, Peru, in the amount of \$70 per month per student. The scholarships were designated for three calendar years, ending in December 2017. (Note that the school year in Peru is March-December). At the recommendation of the Global Missions Committee, the OSLC Council has approved the program for three more years! The Lutheran Church of Chiclayo (IELCH) will administer the program, so that the scholarships now represent a true collaboration between our two churches. IELCH will set criteria for the selection of students, and also will be responsible for oversight of student progress. The plan is that the scholarships will continue to be awarded to young women, one from each of the three congregations in Chiclayo.





Our first three scholarship recipients (from left to right) are Miriam Gómez Uriarte (from the San Antonio congregation), Priscila Tirado Bensus (from the Las Brisas congregation), and Susi Llontop Soplapuco (from the Las Lomas congregation). Yes, this photo was taken at a Starbucks in Chiclayo!

Susi has completed her bachelor's degree in accounting at Universidad Católica Santo Toribio de Mogrovejo in Chiclayo, and has started looking for full-time employment in her field. She is our first true success story!

Miriam is starting the fourth year of a five-to-six-year program in Organizational Psychology at Universidad César Vallejo in Chiclayo. By all accounts, she is working hard and doing well. She is the only student of the three to continue in the scholarship program.

Priscilla studied at several institutions, from culinary arts to business administration. Her goals are to open a shelter for stray animals in Chiclayo, and also to open a pastry shop.
