How are you being called to fearlessly follow Jesus in a new way?

Here at OSLC, a couple of new ministries are opening up to us. Shari Lundberg will become the new Parish Administrator when Janet Heck retires in May. With Shari's new role, OSLC will have a new face to welcome them. The ministry space downstairs in the church will soon be occupied by Encompass (www.encompassnw.com), and in short time our church will be used by a diverse group of people doing amazing things. Finally, several of you are joining a short-term small group ministry called Koinonia Groups. These groups will birth refreshed and renewed understandings of what God is up to in your life. Friends, do not let the Easter season pass you without thinking about how God is moving in your life. Jesus' resurrection gives us hope for today. To miss seeing this hope each and every day during this season would be sad. God is alive and working in our church and in your lives.

Council President's Message:

At our March meeting, Council was tasked with determining the amount of a donation we would ask from Encompass, the organization that will be making use of our downstairs ministry space. Ulti-

mately, Council approved this motion: In accordance with our calling to fearlessly follow Jesus OSLC will offer the preschool space to Encompass as our partnership in this special ministry to our community. There will be no expectation of reimbursement from Encompass for use of the space or utilities. We believe this offering is in accordance with our mission statement and at this time is good stewardship of the gifts and facilities that God has given this church family. This position can be revisited at the time of contract renewal.

This was not a decision Council arrived at quickly or took lightly. The discussions lasted several days and I believe the Holy Spirit led us through this time of discernment. The discussion pushed and stretched us to really consider and apply our vision and values—are we truly willing to live them out? We felt the amount we were asking would reflect how we viewed this partnership—was it simply a landlord/tenant relationship, or, did we view this as a ministry partnership? Financially, we currently have a sizable cash reserve. We did not ask for any donation of the preschool, nor do we request a donation from the other ministries using our space, such as AA or the Lutheran Counseling Network. It did not feel appropriate to begin now.

We also felt this is not a one-sided partnership and the benefits for us are many, including:

- This is a church-wide benevolence that helps serve a need in our community.
- It is good stewardship of the space God has given us. Having it occupied means it is being monitored and maintenance issues can be addressed before they grow into large, expensive problems. The space has sat empty and decaying—how long would it have been before someone had noticed if, say, a pipe had burst? How much damage could have been done? Having the space in use helps mitigate this risk.
- We are provided with free advertising as Encompass offers services here. This will also be getting people in our building who might not have come otherwise.

We believe this will give additional, yet-unknown blessings. In closing, I am reminded of the words and music Scott Hafso so wonderfully wrote for us: "Knowing that God goes before us....going wherever God leads!"



It was especially nice to commune with everyone from the church who came to eat supper and attend the beautiful Holden Evening Prayer Service following supper.

In February we had another Lunch for the Break in conjunction with the Issaquah Food and Clothing Bank before the Issaquah Schools Mid-Winter Break. Over 385 children were served with extra food to take home to eat during the break. We were able to do a survey of the parents receiving the food. We wanted to find out

which foods they liked and used the most and if there were foods that they didn't use. This was very helpful in preparing for our next Lunch for the Break which will occur on April 4th (food drop off date) and 5th(food pick-up day). From the survey the list of foods has been modified to better meet the needs of the families that participate. As always, if you are able to donate a box of food please use the modified list posted in the Sunday bulletin when shopping. It is also possible and very easy to buy a box of food without going to the grocery store. If you go to the Issaquah Food and Clothing Bank website you will be able to click on Lunch for the Break and follow the prompts to order your box. It will be delivered to the food bank and eventually to one of the distribution sites for the food. Our Savior is one of three sites in Issaquah. Thank you to all of the people who donated boxes for the Mid-Winter Break. Your support is so appreciated and needed among many of the children in our community. Thank you in advance if you are able to donate for the upcoming event.

Negotiations are under way with Encompass for use of the former preschool space. We are in the process of finding out more specifics about what Encompass needs to do to modify the space. Some repairs are being made to the roof and ceiling to make the room more safe and useable. It is our desire to bring

the room up to code and be good stewards of this space which has been neglected since the preschool closed. Council, after much prayer and soul-searching, has decided that to be true partners in ministry with Encompass, will offer this space with no charge. Encompass can make a donation to the church if they desire. We feel that the work Encompass does is highly valuable to the children of our community and represents very well our mission. We are stepping out in faith to be full partners to the work by offering what we have to give--our space. Again, I want to thank social concerns committee members, Judi Case and Don Robertson, for leading us through the RFP process. Their knowledge and energy has been so helpful.

Judi Case is also organizing a new event in conjunction with the Issaquah Food and Clothing Bank. They are planning an event that will take place in May to offer free prom dresses and tuxes for high school children who want to go to the prom but cannot afford the cost of these dressy items. Judi can use donations of gently used prom dresses. Please see this issue of the Focus for more information.

Once again, our faithful cooks prepared and served a wonderful meal for the Issaquah Meals Program on March 13th.

ICS is a unique non-profit in that it operates with 100% volunteer staff and board members. Our volunteers are the heart and soul of ICS

and we wouldn't exist without them.

ICS was founded in 1973 by local churches and community organizations that saw a need in the community for emergency financial help. ICS helps prevent homelessness by providing emergency financial assistance to help with a rent payment to avoid eviction, or a utility bill to prevent a shutoff of power or water resulting in eviction. In 2017, we helped 541 households.

ICS is looking for additional office staff that can work a minimum of 2 days per month, (approx. 3 hrs./day), or more if desired. Our office hours are Monday-Friday 8:45 a.m. –11:30 a.m., and Monday evening from 6:15 p.m. –7:45 p.m. Other volunteer help needed if you cannot work in the office: computer help with updating our Facebook account, grant research/writing, or other misc. projects. ICS has an office in the back of Community Hall located at 180 E Sunset Way Issaquah, (where the evening meal program is served).

proved, so that the local church has the main responsibility for student selection and oversight. The scholarship program now represents a true partnership between OSLC and IELCH.
