A Health Update from Dave Carlson

I'm moved to give all my friends a health update. This is very difficult for me; I have a hard time asking for help, admitting some sort of dependence on friends and strangers for a need I have.

Long story short, I need a kidney transplant within the next year. I am feeling fine now, but I have been a diabetic for more than 50 years, and it has taken a toll on my kidney function, which is hovering around 20 %. I am currently on the kidney transplant list, and the average wait time without a living donor is about 5 years. But the surgeons think I only have about a year left that they can do the transplant surgery, due to the diabetes affect on my circulatory system. I'm asking that this information be shared in hopes that all my friends become aware of the need and that someone might be moved to consider donating a kidney. I appreciate this more than you know, thank you.

Please join us in praying about this need, and you can also help by sharing the news with anyone and everyone you know. You need not be a match to donate for me; the Kidney Foundation has an excellent matching program and gleefully matches donors and recipients in a 'swap' process – we heard they once matched up 37 donors with 37 recipients!



The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. (John 10:2-4)



These verses about the Good Shepherd are comforting, no matter our age. When we are young, we have a special affinity for the Good Shepherd. We are open to the love and care the Shepherd gives, and are able to give back that same deep love. We want to hear our names and follow. We find joy in being sheep of the Good Shepherd.

As we grow, our scope changes, and we look beyond the safety, love and care of this loving relationship. We develop interests that take us to different places. We may stray off the path. But when that happens, the Shepherd comes looking for us. The Shepherd values each of us, seeks after us when we are in danger, and welcomes us back into the fold.


