anyone whom they wanted. ¹⁶At that time they had a notorious prisoner, called Jesus Barabbas. ¹⁷So after they had gathered, Pilate said to them, "Whom do you want me to release for you, Jesus Barabbas or Jesus who is called the Messiah?" ¹⁸For he realized that it was out of jealousy that they had handed him over. ¹⁹While he was sitting on the judgment seat, his wife sent word to him, "Have nothing to do with that innocent man, for today I have suffered a great deal because of a dream about him." ²⁰Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowds to ask for Barabbas and to have Jesus killed. ²¹The governor again said to them, "Which of the two do you want me to release for you?" And they said, "Barabbas." ²²Pilate said to them, "Then what should I do with Jesus who is called the Messiah?" All of them said, "Let him be crucified!" ²³Then he asked, "Why, what evil has he done?" But they shouted all the more, "Let him be crucified!"

²⁴So when Pilate saw that he could do nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he took some water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying, "I am innocent of this man's blood; see to it yourselves." ²⁵Then the people as a whole answered, "His blood be on us and on our children!" ²⁶So he released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified.

²⁷Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor's headquarters, and they gathered the whole cohort around him. ²⁸They stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, ²⁹and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on his head. They put a reed in his right hand and knelt before him and mocked him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" ³⁰They spat on him, and took the reed and struck him on the head. ³¹After mocking him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him away to crucify him.

³²As they went out, they came upon a man from Cyrene named Simon; they compelled this man to carry his cross. ³³And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull), ³⁴they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. ³⁵And when they had crucified him, they divided his clothes among themselves by casting lots; ³⁶then they sat down there and kept watch over him. ³⁷Over his head they put the charge against him, which read, "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews."

³⁸Then two bandits were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left. ³⁹Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads ⁴⁰and saying, "You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross." ⁴¹In the same way the chief priests also, along with the scribes and elders, were mocking him, saying, ⁴²"He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe in him. ⁴³He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he wants to; for he said, 'I am God's Son.'" ⁴⁴The bandits who were crucified with him also taunted him in the same way.

⁴⁵From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. ⁴⁶And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" ⁴⁷When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "This man is calling for Elijah." ⁴⁸At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. ⁴⁹But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him." ⁵⁰Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last. ⁵¹At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split. ⁵²The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. ⁵³After his resurrection they came out of the tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many. ⁵⁴Now when the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said, "Truly this man was God's Son!"

SERMON Being of the Same Mind

I was born into a family of swimmers. In fact, I learned how to swim so early in life that I can't even remember learning. By the time I was 14, I was certified as a Senior Life Saver. And after high school I became certified to teach swimming lessons to others. I kept my certification up in my twenties so that I could make a few bucks each summer doing what I

already loved to do—swim, and help others to swim, with safety. It still surprises me when I meet an adult who has never learned how to swim.

I do not know if they still teach the rules of Life Saving the same way they did when I first learned them. But I assume that they do, at least when it comes to the most important rules. And the number one rule in every lifesaving class I ever took was always the same: "Save yourself first!" Simple. Straightforward. Common sense. Every life saver memorized it as though their life depended upon it. And probably did. "Save yourself first!"

In every life saving situation, there is always an element of danger. And any attempt a provide a rescue in middle of that danger only adds to it. The loss of two lives is worse than one. To lose your life trying save the life of another, though perhaps a heroic act to the rest of the world, is the ultimate failure for a trained life saver. It only adds to the tragedy. So we were trained to first think, "Can I be sure that I can get out of this situation alive?" If there was any doubt about your ability to answer that question, "Yes," the rescue should not be attempted. "Save yourself first!" That's the rule.

What is interesting about the number one rule of life saving is that, most of the time, it is also the number one rule of life. Whether said straight out, or simply implied, saving yourself first is the way life is lived. "The best thing you can do for your child," it has been said, "is to take care of your marriage." And also, "The best thing you can do for your marriage is to become a strong, healthy individual yourself."

Only in a few of the most unusual circumstances, can we imagine someone overriding rule number one. A parent may risk his or her life to save a child. A soldier may deliberately enter the line of fire out of duty or love for a buddy. But even these are heroic, tragic events which most of us would rather avoid.

The early followers of Jesus, however, saw in the way that he lived, the way that he died, and in his resurrection from death, the introduction into the world a new Rule Number One. Jesus did many miraculous things. He taught and said some earth-shaking things. He even died a sad and tragic death for doing and saying those things. And while those who loved him remembered all of that after his death, what he said and did in life was not the heart of what they remembered, the core of their message about him to the rest of the world, the thing that excited them, energized their relationships with each other and God, the thing that gave them the courage to stand up for what is good and true and right in the world even in the face of the most horrendous persecution—was the realization that Jesus had rejected the Life Savers Rule Number One.

Jesus willingly chose <u>not</u> to save himself first, or second, or even after hundreds of others. Jesus did not choose to save himself at all. Rather, he entered into his own death as though it was his purpose for life, trusting in the God who first gave him life to give it back again.

And that impressed people. It impressed people so much that they came to believe that, in Christ, God was changing the way the whole world would work from now on.

When St. Paul wrote to the Church at Philippi, encouraging them to settle their differences, to stand firm in the faith, and to work for the good of the poor and needy in their lives, he focused his thoughts on this same early understanding of Jesus' life purposes.

The verses from Philippians Chapter 2 which were read as our Reading for today are not Paul's own words. Oh, some of them are. The first half of a sentence is all Paul, "Let the

same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus." That is a summary of Paul's whole theology. Being of the same mind with Jesus was the core of everything Paul believed and taught, sometimes with an almost sense of desperation. But all the other words in this reading are not Paul's words. Paul is quoting words which he and his hearers have already heard many times.

Almost all of the scholars of the New Testament agree. This is a hymn, sung regularly among the earliest gatherers of those who knew Jesus. And like the hymns of our day, they were carefully crafted words, easily committed to memory by their repetition, and cherished for their power to inspire faith.

"Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, becoming human, taking on the form of a slave. And being found in human form humbled himself and became obedient onto death, even death on the cross." (Paul might have added that last piece about the cross, scholars are unsure.) But then the second verse of the hymn reverses this downward movement. "Therefore God has highly exalted him and given him the name which is above every other name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the Glory of God the Father."

That's it. That's the hymn. Pretty straightforward theology. But in its sweeping downward and upward movement, it introduces an antithesis to human life as we know it: a deliberate giving away, letting go, emptying of ones life in violation of the rules of life. That is, Rule One of All Rule Ones, "Saving yourself first!"

When Paul says, "Have this same mind in you as was in Christ Jesus," he is not really asking for us to engage in this impossible task. It is simply not in us to be able to do that. Every fiber of our being is wired for self-preservation. This is why we are putting our economic future in peril by hunkering down in our homes these days. This is why we put alarms and cameras all around our property. And this is why we argue for the right to own and carry guns. These are the things that we worry about. We are people who want to live, not die. Survival is in our nature.

During the next seven days, every one of us is invited to consider a different way of being in the world. It is Holy Week. It is a week for walking with our Lord, trying the best we can to understand this act of letting go of his life. So that when get to Easter morning we might be changed just a little bit by the experience. Or we may not be changed. It's hard to tell. But either way, we will have had a brief glimpse into the way that God chooses to be present for us.

At least will have seen, for the briefest of moments, the deep love that God has for the world he created. And maybe that is enough.

As an introduction to the week, to bring you more deeply into the story, I read a large portion of those events a few minutes ago. But this it is only half of the story. It represents the first half of that ancient hymn. It is the story of the downward movement, the movement of Jesus giving himself away for us.

Next Sunday we get the other half, the exhilarating upward movement of Easter morning. The poet Wallace Stevens writes about this experience in his popular poem entitled, "The Well Dressed Man With a Beard." Stevens writes:

After the final no there comes a yes
And on that yes the future world depends.
No was the night. Yes is this present sun.
If the rejected things, the things denied,
Slid over the western cataract, yet one,
One only, one thing that was firm, even
No greater than a cricket's horn, no more
Than a thought to be rehearsed all day, a speech
Of the self that must sustain itself on speech,
One thing remaining, infallible, would be
Enough.

This week is the NO of night. Next week, Easter, is the one thing, the YES of the Sun.
