<sup>22</sup>Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, "Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. <sup>23</sup>For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. <sup>24</sup>The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, <sup>25</sup>nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. <sup>26</sup>From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, <sup>27</sup>so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. <sup>28</sup>For 'In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said, 'For we too are his offspring.'

<sup>29</sup>Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. <sup>30</sup>While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, <sup>31</sup>because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead."

SERMON A God for the Gods Pastor Jim Kruse

This large marble outcropping of stone is the site in Athens where the First Reading for today morning took place. It is called the Areopagus which in Greek means, "The Rock (or

Hill) of Ares." Ares was the Greek god of war. When the Romans took control of the Greek Empire they shared the same basic religious system but they gave all of the gods Roman names. The Roman God of war is named Mars. The Areopagus is also known as "Mars' Hill."

The Areopagus sits at the base of the stairs that lead to the Acropolis of Athens, the highest point of the city. At the height of its popularity, hundreds of years before Paul arrived, the Acropolis was covered on top, and on the sides with religious shrines. Over the years it had been built and rebuilt many times. But by the time Paul gets to Athens, the city had been attacked, captured, and even sacked. The Greek Empire itself had fallen apart. And Athens was now firmly under Roman control.

And yet the religious and cultural outlook of the world had not changed much. It was a culture, like most cultures before it, and many cultures after it, that believed that the world that humans inhabited, the world that we experience on a moment by moment basis, is lived in the imperfect shadow of the fuller, more complete, and more powerful world of the gods. Contact between the world of human life and this greater world of the gods was more by accident than by divine plan. In fact, according to this worldview, the purpose of almost all human religious activity was simply to get the attention of the gods. Get them to look your way, to care about you, and ultimately, to be persuaded to use their powers to improve your own life.

Every human activity, every act of love, war, wisdom, and most especially production of food, needed the power of a god promoting it, or it would fail. And each of these gods, great and small, needed some sort of shrine, some sort of artistic image, in order to attract human attention. The more important the god was to their livelihood, the bigger and fancier the shrine needed to be.

[On the right of the stairs going up is the shrine to Nike, the god of victory, being restored in this photo. The central shine on the top of the Acropolis is the Parthenon, the shrine for Athena, the god of wisdom, and the namesake of city.]

And so, as the power and influence of the Greek people in the world decreased, the number of idols and shines in Athens increased. The city was full of them. And this was especially true in and around the Acropolis. It has been said, a bit tongue-in-cheek, that in the city of Athens that Paul visited there were more gods than there were people.

It appears that, in the attempt to cover all their bases, the people of Athens had used up all of the names and jobs for the gods that they could think of. So, just to be sure, someone had even erected a small shrine in the middle of and entitled it, "To an Unknown God."

On the other side of the Areopagus, down in the valley, is the ancient Agora, or city market where various schools of philosophy had set up schools to study and discuss all kinds of wisdom. Luke, who is the author of Acts, tells us that Paul begins his ministry been wandering around the city, trying to engage these philosophers and teachers in some sort of discourse over the ancient God of the Hebrews and how Jesus Christ had fulfilled their expectation of a savior. But he was not having much luck until he discovers this little shrine "To an Unknown God," and uses their practice of creating images of the gods, to get his message across. Finally, Paul is invited up to the base of to the Areopagus to explain himself.

On its surface, it is easy to say of our world, that we have not come all that far from the ancient Athenians. We live in a world that is fractured into a small handful of major religions. And each one of these is broken into a multitude of factions. The religions of the world each claim to have some corner on the truth about where God is active and how human beings can get in on what God is doing. Taken as a whole, the spiritual life of the world looks chaotic, competitive, and confusing. How can God or the gods, hear all of this and respond regularly and faithfully?

We would like to think that Christianity, or at least our particular brand of Christianity, has risen above fray. We think that we have a clearer revelation of the power and intentions of God through the presence of Jesus Christ. We point to the evidence of the life changing activity of the risen Christ in the lives of people of faith over thousands of years, and over the face of the whole world. And even though the various denominations of Christianity argued about the details that separate them, the central message remains unique and superior to all other claims. There is only one all-powerful God, who revealed himself in the life, death, and resurrection of Christ, and remains accessible to all who believe in his power to save them.

But when you look more closely at the way we order our lives, the problem that Paul is addressing in Athens still exists, even among us who trust in Christ. It is a problem that is deeply embedded in the human heart. Each of us wants our lives to go the way we want it to go, and we want God to help us make it go that way. We call upon Jesus in the same way that the ancient world called upon Apollo or Athena or Zeus. We claim to be Christians, and find our identity within a recognized Christian community. But when things go sideways, our words and our actions demonstrate that we really believe that the world as we know it exists in shadow of a powerful God, and that contact between this world and God is more by accident than by divine plan.

Now, more than ever, in the wake of the coronavirus pandemic, our spiritual outlook is to work hard to get God's attention, to look our way, and to persuade God to use his power to intervene on our behalf. We live our lives as though we have always kept that extra little shrine, built to honor the God that we do not understand, just in case.

From his position on the side of Mars' Hill, Paul's looks at the complex, tangled mess in Athens as says plainly, "Look, the God that you are all trying to worship, the God who is behind everything that exists, the God who is active in all things, day by day moment by moment, cannot be controlled. Human beings cannot create a place for God, an image for God, even an experience of God, and say, 'That is God! There He is!' Human beings cannot reach out to God, or influence God's powers, or manipulate God to act according to their desires.

The actions of God, Paul says, are not random and accidental. But they are deliberate and intentional, and are extended all people. All of creation, all nations, all countries and places, are of God's making. Human contact with God is not by accident. But rather, God is at all times creating, directing, providing and preserving, the lives and activities of all things. Even the human desire to grope around, trying to find God, is part of God's design.

Jesus puts Paul's words in a different way in the Gospel for today as he seeks to reassure his disciples just before his crucifixion and resurrection. As he is removing himself from them, returning to God the Father, so that he can be present with them in spirit, he says, "I will not leave you orphaned. I am coming to you in another form. I will give you another Advocate to be with you forever. You know him, because he abides in you, and he will be in you."

What Jesus is saying to his disciples, and what Paul is saying to the people of Athens, and what God is saying through them, to us, is to let God be God. And let the creation and creatures of creation be just that. Be satisfied with the ways that God has chosen to be revealed. Trust in the God who has been revealed in the life, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus.

Be satisfied with the way God chooses to run things. Let God be the one who acts, your job is to receive God in the acts and be grateful for it. All this running after God, all this creating of idols, all this hooting and hollering and attempts to peal back what is, to find out what is behind what is, is just making you look silly.

To stand amid these amazing ruins, testaments to the knowledge, skill, and passion of people who lived thousands of years and hundreds of generations ago, is to be impressed. You have to stand in awe at the deep desire of the Athenians to reach out to God. There is a part of you that is amazed and thankful that these shrines and idols have stood the test of time.

And yet, more impressive is how the words of Paul, simple, straight forward, direct, have not just carried forward in the lives of the faithful, but continue to give them life, hope, courage, vision, and peace, in the midst of a world that is still as unknown as it ever was.

God is present. You know him. "In him we live and move and have our being." Thanks be to God.
