**SERMON** 

Who Are These, Where Did They Come From?

See if something like this has ever happened to you.

A few years ago I was flying home from visiting my brother in Colorado. I was sitting quietly waiting for the announcement to start boarding the plane when a voice came over the load speaker, "We have overbooked the seating in Coach. If there is anyone who would like to upgrade to First Class for a small fee, please see the agent at the counter." I had never flown in First Class, and I did not see much of a rush to the counter, so I wandered over to check it out. A few minutes later I was holding a boarding pass for a First-Class flight from Denver to Seattle.

I knew almost immediately that the man sitting in the window seat was accustomed to this more luxurious level of travel. There was something about his clothes and his bags and the way he did not looked up from his reading to acknowledge me that let off an aura of familiarity to the setting. But mostly it was just the way he just sort of comfortable settled into his seat that said, "This is my place in the world. You are welcome to your seat, but don't get used to this station in life."

It was not until we were well into the flight and had exchanged a few pleasantries that I suddenly realized that this man was someone I should know, a celebrity of some sort. And so I spent the rest of the flight sitting in silence, wracking my brain, trying to figure out who he was. We walked off the plane together and toward the exit, me knowing that he knew that I knew that he was somebody, and him knowing that I did not know who he was. And when I met my wife just outside the security checkpoint doors, I asked her, "Who is that?" And she told me who it was. And I said, "Oh, that's right. I was sitting next to him on the plane."

In keeping with the spirit of the moment, I am not going to tell you who it was. That is not really the point. I am only going to ask, "Has something like this ever happened to you? Have you ever been out in public and someone from TV or from local or national fame crossed your path?

I usually do not recognize famous people out in public. Some people are really good at doing that. They have a kind of radar for celebrities. But I am not one of them. Mostly, I guess, everyone looks pretty much the same to me. I mean, everyone looks different then the next person, but no one looks any more special than anyone else. But I think a part of me wants to believes that each one of us is special enough that, given the right time and circumstances, each one of us would stand out in a crowd. I like to imagine, when I am out and about in the world, that the whole crowd is a crowd of special, unique, famously undiscovered people.

This is what it sounds like to me, on this All Saints Sunday, when the writer of First John writes to the early Christian community, "See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God. ... We are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed."

And again in the Revelation of John, when John does not recognize the great multitude of saints gathered in heaven, the Great heavenly Elder has to say to John, "Why, these are they who have gone through the great ordeal and have washed their robes white in the blood of the Lamb."

The saints of God—those who have gone before us and those who will follow behind us, as well as those who live among us, even we ourselves—do not stand out as saints when they walk around in the world. We live our lives as ordinary people, blending in with one another, living the life God has given us to live, accomplishing extraordinary feats of parenting, clerking, teaching, encouraging, dog-walking, three meals-a-day making, and safely transporting. We are the saints of God, clinging to life by the grace of God, being who we are by the powerful imagination of God, and trusting that the promise of life for all time under God's care, continues even as we leave this world to return to our Maker.

In a few moments, during the prayers, you are going to hear read a list of names. And if you have the bulletin in front of you, you can read them now. It is the custom at Our Savior on All Saints Sunday (as it is in most congregations) to name out loud those who have died during the last year and been honored in our ministry here. As I look over this list, no one stands out as more important or more memorable than any one else. Some of these people I knew, most of them I did not. But you did. Someone did.

Some of them may have sat next to you next to you in the pews here at Our Savior Lutheran every Sunday. A bunch of them may have been on committees and accomplish the work

here. Some of them may have been are sick or frail for a long time, and are only remembered today by a handful of family and friends. All of them, in their own way, are precious Children of God's making: unforgettable, irreplaceable, undeniable, and unrepeatable.

We are who we are, not just because we know God, and love God, and trust in God's love. We are who we are because we knew Barbara and Evelyn and Don and Dee. We are who we are because we knew David and Gustavo and Talton and Louise. We loved them and they loved us. We are who we are because God loved us through them and we loved God by loving them back.

More and more the church of Christ, the gathering of the Saints of God in this world, looks like the descriptions given us this morning by the words of The Revelation of John and the First Letter of John. More and more we come out of a world that does not know us for who we are, "Children of God." We come to this place from busy lives, ordinary lives, doing extraordinary things, blending in with the crowd. We come from nowhere to praise and thank our Lord and God, who became like us in our ordinariness; poor in spirit, mournful, meek, and merciful; pure in heart, hungering for righteousness, praying for peace.

We gather as best we can during this time of isolation and electronic connections, to remember and praise the "way of God": the way that came to life in actions and voices of the prophets of old, the way that lead Jesus into suffering and death on a cross, the way that finds its culmination with the Christ of God reigning over all things. And then we go out, the Saints of God, undercover, infiltrating our homes and schools and work places with this same compassionate love. Once in a while someone will recognize us, a living saint, "that was Marlene, there goes Jerry, did you see Peter?"

But most of the time, the best we can hope for is the question of John, "who are these, robed in white, and where did they come from?" with the knowledge we are what we are, children of God waiting to be revealed.

#### Commemorations for the Week

### All Saints Day, Sunday, November 1

The custom of commemorating all of the saints of the church on a single day goes back at least to the third century. All Saints Day celebrates the baptized people of God, living and dead, who make up the body of Christ. On this day or the following Sunday, many congregations will remember the faithful who have died during the past year.

## Martín de Porres, renewer of society, died 1639, Tuesday, November 3

Martín was the son of a Spanish knight and a freed black slave from Panama. As a lay brother in the Order of Preachers (Dominicans), he engaged in many charitable works in Lima, Peru. He founded an orphanage, a hospital, and a clinic for cats and dogs.

# John Christian Frederick Heyer, died 1873; Bartholomaeus Ziegenbalg, died 1719; Ludwig Nommensen, died 1918; missionaries, Saturday, November 7

Heyer was the first missionary sent out by American Lutherans. After teaching at Gettysburg College and Seminary he was assigned to the Andhra region of India. A worker among the Tamil people on the southeast coast of India, Ziegenbalg was opposed both by local Hindus and by Danish authorities who favored a different missionary style. He was known for caring about the welfare of the whole person. Nommensen was born in northern Germany and was sent to Sumatra as a Lutheran missionary. Working among the Batak people, he translated the scriptures into their language, and honored their native culture.


