SECOND LESSON

2 Corinthians 5:20b--6:10

^{20b}We entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. ²¹For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

^{6:1}As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. ²For he says, "At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you." See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! ³We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, ⁴but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, ⁵beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; ⁶by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, ⁷truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; ⁸in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors,

and yet are true; 9as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; 10 as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

Matthew 6:1-6,16-21 THE GOSPEL

Jesus said to the disciples: 1"Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be

seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven.

²"So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ³But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, 4so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

5"And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ⁶But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward vou.

¹⁶"And whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces so as to show others that they are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ¹⁷But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, ¹⁸so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

¹⁹"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; ²⁰but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. ²¹For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

Pastor Jim Kruse Where is Your Treasure? SERMON

This finely crafted wooden box sits prominently on the top of my dresser in my bedroom at home. In fact, I don't think it has ever left the house until today when I brought it here to make this video. This box contains ashes, the little bit of dust that remains from the life that was our first Golden Retriever puppy. His name was Ollie. For more than a decade, from 2004 to 2013, Ollie was my best friend. Unlike the therapy dogs that we now raise and train for their work of comforting children and adults in need, Ollie was a strong, independent, athletic dog whose only work in life was to play as hard he could for as long as he could. And then to stay as close to me as possible, waiting for his next opportunity. He was a great friend and more courageous than I will ever be. And I still miss him very much.

I am not sure why I keep this container of ashes close at hand. I just know that, if put this box into a closet or drawer, or if I carefully spread the contents under a tree in the yard—if I do not rise from sleep every morning to see this box when I first open my eyes, I will be diminished in some important way.

I do know it is not because I am trying to hold onto some little portion Ollie for fear that I will forget him, or that it eases my sense of loss in some way. That's not it. No, I think this beautiful box of ashes is more of a reminder that, even if what remains of Ollie Is only ashes, it is still ashes. It is still something of the earth. It is a reminder that, for a few short years, a life took up space in this world, and was sustained by the food and water that this world provides. And that because of this life, I am different, and the world is different, than it otherwise would have been. As fragile and as fleeting and as fraught with danger life is, life still matters. Every life matters. Matter matters to God! Maybe that's it!

I said this at Easter last year, and I said it at Christmas a few months ago, and I will say it again today: This may be the most unusual Ash Wednesday you will ever experience in your lifetime. The usual calls of Lent, the call to set aside the busy-ness of your life, to simplify what is overwhelming and complex, to refrain from satisfying your appetites for the extra pleasures of life—these things do not have the power over us that they once did. Because if we worked at doing these things this year, life would not be that much different than it already is.

The self-isolation and restrictive life-style of life under the COVID pandemic are already a perpetual Lenten experience. We do not need to be reminded that we are mortals when a half a million fellow Americans have lost their lives to this disease during the past year. We do not need to be reminded of our vulnerability as creatures of God's creation when violence and human selfishness threaten us from every side.

This year, we have an opportunity to be reminded that the opposite is also true. This year our disciplines of Lent can be about honestly facing up to the reality that the fact that we exist at all is a miracle beyond comprehension, that just being alive, just waking up each morning from our daily dalliance with death, is the surest sign of God's love and grace. Instead of fasting from the blessings and pleasures of life, things that we have already pushed to the side because our very survival is at stake, let us keep a fast from sadness and disappointment and despair.

After all, if life is so fleeting, so fragile, so fraught with struggle, then why does God bother to so carefully imagine every tiny detail of every one of us and every element of creation. It doesn't make sense—unless there is something inherently precious about each cell of our being and each breath that we take. Let us consider this Lent, that it is not because the creatures of God's making must last forever that they must be so carefully and lovingly crafted. But rather, it is because they don't last very long that they must be so beautiful.

"Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also," Matthew places on the lips of Jesus in our Ash Wednesday Gospel. But this year, maybe it is more important to spend time contemplating that the opposite is also true: Where your heart is, there your treasure will be."

Welcome to the next six weeks of your life. Welcome to Lent 2021, the most unusual season of Lent you will ever know.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

PM: Blessed be the holy Trinity, + one God, who brings us out of captivity into freedom, out of the wilderness into the promised land, out of death into life.

C: Holy God, holy and mighty, holy and immortal, have mercy on us.

PM: For reluctance in sharing the gifts of God, and for carelessness with the fruits of creation:

C: Holy God, holy and mighty, holy and immortal, have mercy on us.

PM: For hurtful words that condemn, and for angry deeds that harm:

C: Holy God, holy and mighty, holy and immortal, have mercy on us.

PM: For idleness in witnessing to Jesus Christ, and for squandering the gifts of love and grace:

C: Holy God, holy and mighty, holy and immortal, have mercy on us.

PM: In the mercy of almighty God, Jesus Christ was given to die for us, and for his sake God forgives us all our sins. Through the Holy Spirit God cleanses us and gives us the power to proclaim the mighty acts of the one who called us out of darkness into his marvelous light. As a called and ordained minister of the church of Christ, and by his authority, I therefore declare to you the entire forgiveness of all your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the + Son, and of the Holy Spirit.
