SECOND LESSON Romans 4:13-25

¹³The promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, ¹⁷as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations")—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. ¹⁸Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." ¹⁹He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. ²⁰No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, ²¹being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. ²²Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." ²³Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, ²⁴but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, ²⁵who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

SERMON

Don't Forget about the Three Days

The first real job I had, I only had for two days. Now I know that doesn't sound like a real job to you, if I only worked it for two days. But it was a real job to me just that same. And that is probably part of the problem. It was a real job to me because I was sixteen years old when I applied for it, the legal age in the State of Hawaii, where I was living, to be able to work at a real job. It was a real job to me because, before I could apply for the job I had to go the Social Security office and get a Social Security card and number. It was a real job to me because it did not involve taking care of other people's children or taking the weeds out of their yards or cutting their grass, all for 50 cents an hour. It was a real job to me because I had to show up at 8:30 in the morning and go home at 5:00 in the evening with only a half hour for lunch. And it was a real job to me because I had to punch a time card, and wait for a pay check, and pack a lunch box every day. But mostly it was a real job to me because I had been looking forward to it for months.

The job was working in the Del Monte pineapple cannery in Honolulu. It was work that many high school kids got for their first job. I am not sure why I wanted the job. My older brother had gone to work when he turned sixteen two years earlier. But working hard has always been in his nature. It was his duty to being alive. And my twin brother went to work at the same time, because he wanted the money. He always wanted money to spend. But it was more complicated than that for me. I did not have a sense of duty to the world, and I did

not need the money. For me, entering the work force was a rite of passage into a world I had only previously imagined. It was time to grow up. It was time to become an adult.

As it turned out, I spent far more time and energy preparing to take this job than I spent working it. The reason I only worked the job for two days is that I found out it is hard, back breaking work stacking cases of cans of pineapples onto wooden pallets all day. I found out that a half an hour is not enough time for a sixteen-year-old to recover from stacking cases of cans of pineapples onto wooden pallets for four hours and still eat a decent lunch. I found out that even though I was a Junior in high school, I was already a lot smarter than the guy whose job it was to tell me how to stack cases of cans of pineapples onto wooden pallets. But most importantly I suddenly realized that, at sixteen years old, I wanted to play one more summer baseball before I graduated from High School. I found out that working hard and having spending money was not nearly as much fun as playing baseball and having no money.

In the Gospel for today, Peter was almost exactly at the point in his life of following Jesus where I was after two days of work. Peter had decided to follow Jesus because he saw something special in this man. Peter saw Jesus captivate the crowds with his teaching. He saw Jesus touch the hearts and lives of sick and dying, people who had no hope in life and no prospects for improvement, and healed them. Peter saw the way Jesus stood up to the religious and governmental authorities and outsmarted them time and again. Peter also liked the way Jesus talked about building a new kingdom, about bringing the lively presence of God into the dreariness of a gray and dying world. Peter had given a good portion of his life, but more importantly, a greater portion of his heart, to the vision of being side by side with Jesus in accomplishing his work.

But then, in today's Gospel, Peter gets a taste of that work will be like when Jesus turns to his disciples and says, "My work is about suffering at the hands of the authorities, my life will be taken from me, and after three days I will rise again. And not only that, but it is the work of everyone who wants to follow behind me, to lose their life in this way as well."

We are not told what Peter said to Jesus, only that it could be characterized a rebuke, a scolding of some sort. We do not know what Peter said, but we do know what Peter found out about being a disciple. Peter found out that being a disciple was not as exciting as he thought it was going to be. Peter found out that the life of being a disciple of Jesus is hard work. It was a life of suffering, it was a life of rejection, it was a life of loss. And after all of that, it was a life that led to death at the hands of others.

Yes, we know what Peter heard in the words of Jesus. But we also know what Peter did not hear that Jesus said (quite openly Mark tells us). Peter did not hear Jesus say, "that after three days I will rise again." We know that Peter did not hear Jesus say that because, if Peter had heard it, Peter would not have been so distraught. Peter would not have been so angry. Peter would not have laid into Jesus with his strong rebuke. If Peter had heard about the three days he would not have been so worried about his own hopes and desires being fulfilled. He would not have abandoned Jesus on the day Jesus was arrested and hastily condemned to death. Had Peter heard about the three days he would have been more willing to stay at Jesus side all the way through.

For most of us, being a part of a Christian community of faith is a meaningful, enlivening experience. It may not always be exciting, but it is at least helpful. We have been touched by the word of God's love for us. We have been comforted by the caring words and prayers of our friends in times of trouble. We have been given hope in the message that those loved ones who have died before us now rest in God's eternal care. And we find meaning in extending the love of God into the lives of those who need to hear and know it.

But there are times in our lives when the words of Jesus in this Gospel lesson seem to be spoken to us as well as the original hearers. "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake and for the sake of the gospel, will save it."

Sometimes these words of Jesus challenge us to care less about who are the "charter" members of the congregation and more about who are the visitors, the strangers to us. Sometimes we hear that word in a challenge to give more time, more money, more of our heart to the work of the Body of Christ. Sometimes we hear that word in a challenge to be more committed in to bible study, worship, and prayer. Sometimes we hear the challenge of God to lose our lives in a more personal way; to give away our lives raising our children or caring for our parents, to let go of our loved ones to death, or to let go of our political views in order to find a common point of justice or peace with others.

But whenever, and how ever, we hear these words as applying to us, our first reaction is the same as Peter's. We are upset. We get angry. We think it is unfair. The desire of our hearts push back, maybe even move onto something else. This is not the life of faith that we thought we had signed up for.

Two more times in the Gospel of Mark, Jesus tells his disciple that he was going to suffer, be rejected, be put to death, and in three days rise again. Three times in all he makes this prediction about the way he will die. And all three times, Peter and the other do not hear the word about the rising again. The first words are too harsh. The first words are too overwhelming. It takes them all the way to the cross of Christ, all the way through the dark sadness of waiting during those three long days, all the way to having the resurrected Jesus appear to them again and again and again, before it finally sinks in. The way that God changes us and our lives is through death and resurrection, giving up and getting back, letting go and seeing what comes next.

When we find ourselves in the middle of God's challenge to give up our hearts, give up our desires, give up the way we have known the world and the church to be in the past; to give our time, our money, and our lives for the sake of the Gospel of Christ; we need to remember the three days. Remember that the grave that held Jesus was soon opened up. Remember that the life we give will be given back. Remember that the troubles we are in will not last forever. Remember the three days. There is always resurrection. There is always new life. There is always the grace of God.

Eventually I got my second chance at my first real job. It was working the overnight shift for a 7-eleven store in my hometown. And I got my chance to learn the lessons of good

hard work. It took Peter several years for this new knowledge to sink in. After three days, life begins anew. Remember the three days!


