To the people of God at Our Savior grace and peace,

I have been pondering as of late thanksgiving, not the holiday, but the attitude or response of gratitude in our lives. I have been wondering what it means to live a life of gratitude, specifically in response to the Gospel. For many years fighting uphill battles with Lutherans surrounding the issues of stewardship and what it means for us to respond to the grace and mercy of God I have witnessed reluctant hearts. Oh not always, there are great stories I can tell of transformed lives with regard to a spirit of thanksgiving but generally I can say, creating or fostering a spirit of gratitude with accompanying actions, is very challenging. Is gratitude taught or caught? Does a prevailing attitude of gratitude come from a family of origin? Can we be schooled in gratitude? All of these questions are in play as we ponder together what it simply means to live into a grateful heart.

Henri Nouwen in an article entitled All is Grace said the following, which I think is so pertinent to the current moment at Our Savior and Shepherd of the Hills. "I am gradually learning that the call to gratitude asks us to say everything is grace. When our gratitude for the past is only partial, our hope for a new future can never be full, As long as we remain resentful about things that we wish had not happened, part of our hearts remain isolated, unable to bear fruit in the new life ahead of us." What Nouwen is suggesting of course is gratitude or the discipline of gratitude encompasses the good and the bad, the joy filled moment and the unexpected sadness. Gratitude is not about taking our pulse in the current moment to see if I am happy therefore grateful. Gratitude rather is to say "everything is grace." The fact that I woke up this morning is grace; the fact I turned on the shower head and hot water came out is grace; the encounter I had with the homeless man is grace; the dinner I had with family and friends is grace; the look of knowing of the child/grandchild is grace. All is grace and grace begets gratitude.



It was kind of wonderful attending a live church service. We have plenty more room for others who wish to attend. I had done the two drive- thru communions, but having others witness your faith adds to it. Hopefully, as our vaccine rate continues to goes up, more members will come back to live services. Encourage your friends and neighbors to get the vaccine. It is a good lesson of loving your neighbor as yourself. If you have questions about the vaccine, ask your doctor, not social media.

I was looking thru my notes of the last council meeting and a sentence I wrote, jumped out at me, "Rick West out of big closet". We've been clearing out the downstairs to make room for possible non-profit tenants. We had to make some room in the big closet upstairs for some of the Scout stuff moved out from downstairs. Rick and his group on the Site Planning Team have been hard at work. Studies have shown that new generations of members don't give at the same higher rate as our seasoned folks. We need to look for ways to generate income to pay for this big building.

We've scheduled our annual congregational meeting for June 27^{th} after the church service. This will be in-person. Budget hearings will be in the library on June 6^{th} and 13^{th} after the church service also.

Guidelines for In-Person Worship

Our Savior Lutheran Church has re-opened our building for small group gatherings and in-person worship.

What does in-person worship look like now? When you're ready to return to worship in-person, here's some information to help you:

When you arrive: starting at 9:45am, you will be asked to enter through the main doors and speak with the greeter for a Covid protocol check-in. Note that masks must be worn when inside the building, and physical distancing maintained. Hand sanitizer stations are located throughout the facility. The main level restrooms are open.

During the worship service: Bulletins will be provided. Seating has been arranged to maintain physical distancing; thank you for not moving any of the markers or chairs. Masks must be worn. Per State/Synod guidelines: worship leaders (Pastor Vaswig, Lectors/Assisting Ministers) will unmask at the time of speaking. One unmasked, physically-distanced Cantor will lead the singing. Congregation members are welcome to sing if they are wearing triple-layered masks per State/Synod guidelines, or otherwise hum the service music.

Will there be Holy Communion? Yes, but it will look a little different. Masks must continue to be worn, except for the moment the wine/juice and bread are consumed. Instructions will be shared during the service.

Following the service: please exit the building directly and continue all conversations outside. There will be no coffee hour for the foreseeable future, and Anderson Hall will remain closed following the service.

Live-streaming of our services will continue. Not ready to gather or away from Issaquah? We will continue to live stream our services at 10:00am on OSLC's YouTube Channel, including recordings available for later viewing.

Thank you in advance for your patience as we learn about worshiping together in this next chapter of the story of our life together in these challenging times.

Considering Our Bodies Holy

Honoring your body and worshipping God

Tending the holy temple of your body:

I invite you to recognize that your body is a holy place where the sacred dwells, so treat it like someone you love. Here are some places to start:

KNOW: Wake up in the morning knowing anything you accomplish is icing on the cake because **you are already beloved**.

BREATHE: Set an alarm on your phone or watch to do a body scan and breath check. Our minds may lie to us, yet our breath never does. Take a moment to literally catch your breath.

SLOW DOWN: Breathe before you make that hard decision. Take a holy pause when you receive critical feedback that encourages your defensiveness. You do not need to respond in the moment. You have permission to give yourself time to process. Many of us are constantly in fight, flight or freeze mode. Give yourself permission to breathe yourself into a fuller, more loving narrative. Move from your primitive brain into the frontal lobe cortex where you can actually process and think logically.

FEED: What would feed your soul today? Your spirit? Your body? Ask yourself and see what answer emerges. Is it prayer, taking time to make a favorite home-cooked meal or the ritual of pouring a cup of tea? What would feed you today? Lean into that.

REST: We can either choose when to rest or our bodies can choose for us. This moment has asked so much of our bodies. The amount of cortisol in our blood right now has us constantly ready to pounce, move or fight. The body's response to this much cortisol in the blood is to crash, to shut down into depression. Our bodies cannot maintain that frantic space for too long. Therefore, its way of *helping* us—protecting us—is to shut us down. Instead of frustration, how could we meet ourselves with compassion in those moments?

MOVE: Instead of cursing your body for betraying you, maybe try leaning into your body. Take a breath...take another one. In fact take a moment, stop reading and just breathe. What is your breath trying to tell you? Do you hear that? Can you feel it? Your body is trying to communicate with you. Take a holy pause and listen.

Building Use Guidelines for Group Gatherings During Phase 3

**Should King County change Phase levels, revised guidelines will be distributed.



General Use Protocols:

- Only gatherings of **15 or less** are permitted until we reach Phase 4.
- Everyone must enter and exit the building through the main entrance or the Anderson Hall entrance. All other exit doors may not be used.
- Covid-19 information signage have been posted at these two entrances, including one that can be read from the outside, that lists the symptoms of Covid-19. Anyone exhibiting any of the following symptoms must go home, stay safe, and recover.
 - * Fever greater than 100° F
 - * New cough
 - * Shortness of breath, Sore throat
 - * New muscle pain/achy sore muscles (myalgias)
 - * New fatigue or sudden onset of discomfort/illness (malaise)
 - * New loss of sense of smell/taste (anosmia)
 - * New GI (gastrointestinal) symptoms including diarrhea
 - * Chills
 - * Runny nose
- Everyone must wear a mask while in the building. Masks will be available at the check-in station.
- Touchless gel hand sanitizer stations are located at the entrance.
- A check-in station is provided at the entrance for people to write their names and contact information. Alternatively: One person may hold contact information for the whole group.
- 6-foot social distancing must be maintained.
- Only one person may use the restroom at a time.
- No food or drinks may be consumed in the building during group gatherings.
- The kitchen may not be used for group gatherings. [Exception: The kitchen may be utilized for food preparation in support of the Issaquah community meals program.]

I began my Bishop's Report for the 2021 Synod Assembly on May 15, 2021 by quoting Paul in his letter to the Romans, "I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you, because your faith is proclaimed throughout the world."

I am so glad to be the Northwest Washington Synod with you – as we walk, journey, travel together. We are connected as the body of Christ – as siblings in Christ – together. We are the Northwest Washington Synod in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Together in Jesus Christ

we are freed by grace to live faithfully, witness boldly, and serve joyfully. As people forgiven and redeemed, beloved and welcomed, we are called to embody God's grace in speech, action, and relationships. I am reminded daily that it is Jesus Christ who loves, welcomes, and forgives. As baptized children of God, we are called to participate in this love, hospitality, and forgiveness. I am thankful for all of you for your love, your welcome, and your forgiveness.

We on the synod staff have agreed to embrace the following statement as we work together with the congregations and ministry sites of this synod: "Trusting in the Spirit, we are journeying together with God's people so that all may discover and participate in what God is doing among us through Jesus."

Further, there are five focus areas interwoven in the work that we are doing as we journey together in Christ:

- 1. Faithful Innovation
- 2. Youth and Young Adults
- 3. Leadership
- 4. Connection
- 5. Racial Justice

I'd like to lift up a few of the actions from the 2021 NW WA Synod Assembly:

We had our first online assembly with 332 voting members in attendance on Zoom and over 200 following along on our Facebook Livestream.

We approved the Recommended Changes to the Constitution that were forwarded from the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly.

We approved the changes to the Constitution proposed by the Synod Council (with a minor amendment to have the Nominating Committee changed to 5 persons).

Lutheran Counseling Network Faith and Everyday Life June 2021

Which one of you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go after the one that is lost until he finds it? When he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders and rejoices. And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost.' (Luke 15:4-6)



Let's back up a chapter. Jesus has been talking to the scribes and Pharisees, who criticized Jesus for receiving and eating with sinners. How interesting that sinners were drawn to Jesus, and were comfortable in his presence.

In the above parable, there is no criticism of the one who became lost, no chiding of a sheep whose own foolish choice may have caused the disconnect from its shepherd. The focus and clear emphasis is on the determination of the shepherd to find even one that becomes lost.

Jesus said elsewhere, "If you have seen me, you have seen the Father." What a Father, who is so devoted to his creation that he cares that not even one be lost.

Consider that whatever lost-ness you may have experienced, whether in the past or right now, the heart of the Father is pursuit and finding. It is not a calloused, flippant attitude. Nor is it shaming. Once found, the shepherd is ecstatic and calls his friends and neighbors to share his joy. Connection is restored. As image-bearers of our Father, this longing for deep connection and restoration is in us also. What a Great Shepherd who cares for the many and the one!
