From the Desk of Pastor Vaswig

At the writing of this newsletter we are preparing to vote as two congregations for or against merger. This has been quite the process as we deal with constitutions, endowment funds, leadership, vision and mission, and all those things necessary to merge two congregations. I have appreciated the level of work accomplished by many to arrive at an April 3rd vote. Bob Johnson, the President of Shepherd of the Hills, has been steadfast in his dealing with the closure of the facility of Shepherd of the Hills, the conversation with leadership and the congregation about steps forward and, maintaining an ongoing dialogue with Chuck Bachman, President of Our Savior, about how best to facilitate a joint ministry.

As the process has unfolded folks have made or even are making decisions for themselves as well as the respective congregations about how to move forward both individually and collectively. It is my hope that such decisions are driven less by personal feelings and more by examining what we are called to be as a people of the Gospel. I believe all decisions should be biblically based with the scripture informing whatever decision is made. While we live in the land which accentuates individual choice and freedom, the biblical narrative can sometimes be at odds with the same for the sake of the larger community.

However the "vote" turns out I hope the same indicates the Gospel and regard for the larger community of Issaquah. I hope both congregations will honor their respective ministries and of course decide on a Gospel informed future. May the Spirit bless the conclusion of the process as the Spirit has come alongside throughout.

From the Council President



When Pastor Jim Kruse had his first council meeting at Our Savior Lutheran Church, he insisted we all read "Quietly Courageous, Leading the Church in a Changing World" by Gil Rendle. Rendle is an ordained minister with a PhD in organizational and group dynamics. He has worked with congregations across denominations for more than thirty years.

"Quietly Courageous" offers practical guidance to leaders, both lay and ordained, on leading churches today. It encourages leaders to focus on their mission and purpose—what is ultimately motivating their work. It also urges a shift in perspectives on resources, discusses models of change, and offers suggestions for avoiding common pitfalls and working creatively.

There is no going back. The average age of clergy is 53. The single age most represented in mainline congregations as of 2015 was 60. In 2022, I turn 67 and exactly fit this model. The wish to recapture the old days is strong and a total waste of time and energy.

Pastor Wes Telyea was one of those younger voices who could reflect the realism, from his own experience, to understand the new facts and statistics. The statistics were that 3 out every 4 mainline churches would close in the next 20 years. He called the ones still standing cathedrals. Pr. Telyea said nearby churches would fold and merge into these cathedrals. Others would tear down their structures and be part of office buildings, retirement centers or function out of member's homes. We didn't believe him. We thought we just needed to do the old things better.

Rendle says, "We hold an immense investment in property that is often dramatically underused and poorly maintained, but serves as an albatrossian anchor, restricting movement. He also says, "Instead of looking for saviors, we should be calling for leadership that will challenge us to face problems for which there are no simple painless solutions — problems that require us to learn new ways."

I read this book two years ago and am amazed how much better I understand it after all the changes we are currently undertaking. We are going exactly in the direction we need to be. It's all about purpose, purpose, purpose.

The finance committee also read "The Coming Revolution In Church Economics" by Mark Deymaz. This book is what created the Site Committee.

The current and recent past council members are driving these changes. Pastors' Telyea, Kruse and Vaswig have given us the questions to ponder. I strongly en-

courage you to pick up this book which is inspiring the leadership of your church. We are following facts and figures, not "should haves or could haves." Rendle also says, "Instead of constantly asking how a person or congregation can be an agent of God's Spirit, leaders also need to ask where and how God's Spirit is already at work—and then ask how they can get behind that work and help."

Special Congregational Meeting Sunday, April 3rd at 11:30 am



Join us for a Special Congregational Meeting on Sunday, April 3rd, at 11:30 am. The agenda will include consideration of the Agreement and Plan of Merger ("Merger Agreement") by which Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church will merge into Our Savior Lutheran Church. The Our Savior Lutheran Church Council has approved the Merger Agreement, and recommends that the congregation approve it.

Under the Merger Agreement, Shepherd of the Hills will merge into Our Savior effective May 1st, 2022. The Merged Congregation will be called Our Savior Lutheran Church, and will have new mission and vision as stated in the Merger Agreement. The Shepherd of the Hills members will become members of Our Savior, but can transfer membership after the Merger.

Shepherd of the Hills's endowment funds will be combined with Our Savior's endowment but will be distributed according to Shepherd of the Hills's priorities for five (5) years. Shepherd of the Hills will bring a small portion of the proceeds of the sale of the Shepherd of the Hills real property into the Merger to be used in accordance with the Vision and Mission of the Merged Congregation. The Memorial Cross and Shepherd figure from the Shepherd of the Hills facility will be moved to Our Savior and will occupy places of prominence.

The current presidents of Shepherd of the Hills and Our Savior will serve as copresidents of the Merged Congregation and both the officers and the church council of the merged congregation will contain former members of Shepherd of the Hills.

The Our Savior Lutheran Church congregation will vote on whether to approve the Merger Agreement as presented. Copies of the proposed Merger Agreement are available to any Our Savior Lutheran member upon request made to Kate Maloney at office@shephillschurch.org.

The Spirit

From the Bishop:

One of the things I love about living in the Pacific Northwest is the abundance of life. In January, the grass is green. In February, plants are blooming. In March, little flowers are pushing through soil. In April, color bursts out everywhere. To me, these signs of life are miracles.

And don't we need some of these signs right now? I mean, there are so many places where it feels like ongoing winter -

the discord and acrimony amongst families, churches, peoples, and nations. As I write this article Russia is invading Ukraine. Perhaps when you read this article, things will be different but at this moment there is bombing and shooting and fear and death. And entrenched crises continue: houselessness, racism, ableism, unjust governments, and so much more. Individually, many are experiencing physical and mental illness, fatigue, and exclusion. I remember a quote from C.S. Lewis' book The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe where one of the characters says, "It is winter in Narnia, and has been for ever so long ... always winter, but never Christmas."

It has been a long winter ... perhaps even two years of winter. Pain and sorrow and death feel very close. There is grief, there is anger, there is exhaustion, and there is sadness.

And yet ... And yet ...

Gardens are full of seeds. Farmers are tilling the soil. Tulips are blooming. Rhododendrons are on their way. We see signs around us that winter is ending and the Bringer of Spring is coming.

As I travel through this synod, I see signs of new life and new hope. I see resolve and new partnerships. While there are challenges that we are all facing, while there is much work to do individually and together, I sense new possibilities.

When I meet with councils and other leaders in congregations, I am delighted that we are having good, strong, sometimes difficult conversations about things that matter. In our best moments, we are not as concerned about smaller difficulties but instead, as

people of faith, we are leaning into what it means to love God and love neighbor in this time and in this place. I thank God for the opportunity for conversation, listening, and moving on the Breath of God's Spirit.

The truth is, alone - we cannot create life, alone - we cannot change systems, alone - we cannot move winter into spring. But through Christ, through the One who died for this world and who is raised into new life, we can.

And so, as it is written in Paul's second letter to the Corinthians:

We do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal. 2 *Corinthians* 16-18

We are promised that through this time, through world events, through whatever is next, Jesus is with us. And even more than that, we are promised that there is something amazing beyond all measure - more than we can know or even imagine. It is difficult to sometimes comprehend this promise - especially when we look at the destruction and pain and devastation in this world - and yet ... and yet ... we cling to the promise. As people of faith, we pray and whisper and shout it out - that through Christ's death and resurrection all things that create death will be gone. Period. Full. Stop.

And because of knowing and trusting this promise, we are then called, as beloved children of God, to see, appreciate, and tend to the small plants entrusted to us – knowing that we also are plants, also seeds, also soil, called to live into and share this new life with and for others.

May this Easter spring forth with new life for you. May you feel the hope given through Jesus. And may together we shout, "Happy Easter! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!"





Lutheran Counseling Network Faith and Everyday Life April 2022

Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it. Matthew 13:45-46



This parable is a beautiful and concise story of God's abundant love for us. It is such abundant love that there is only one thing for the merchant to do, and that is give up everything to obtain the pearl. God is the merchant. We, the church and people of God, are God's beloved pearl. God shows up and in Jesus pays the ultimate price to win us.

Understanding love in this abundance is beyond my human ability. I can only grasp it by faith. I can only receive it as grace. I can only recognize it as the essence of God.

I do love the image of a pearl and what it represents. That God's beloved church, that each of us, can be molded and beautified because of some irritant or injury. Like a pearl, God's people are being formed into something new.

I see transformations happen often in my work as a therapist. It is not often a mountain that moves. Most often it is a small shift, a forgiving word, a repaired relationship, a letting-go of a past hurt, a decision to hold on with a loose grip, or a word of God's love that changes everything.

God shows us how to love abundantly. May we be transformed by this love, and learn to love without limit.
