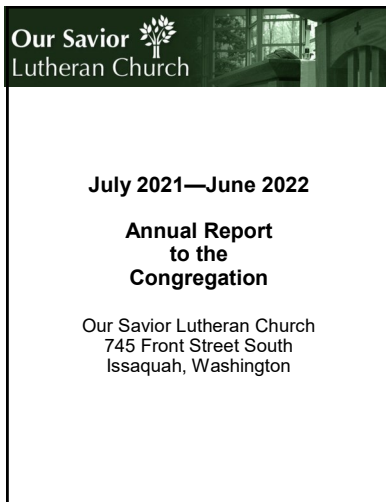


Food, Fellowship & the Future

ELCA Global Missionaries in Japan THE WILSON FAMILY

**The Wilson's are scheduled to join Our Savior for a worship service in August as guest preachers.*

We've just begun our first home leave, and I write this in the house of old friends in New Jersey, where one of our sponsor congregations is located. This summer we will be quite unsettled, packing up camp every few days to visit our next sponsoring congregation. With this and a couple of conferences, we will be journeying quite literally from coast to coast, with stops in Virginia, South Carolina, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Illinois, Minnesota, Washington State, Utah, and California.

Illness & Recovery

The most dramatic event of the last few months was my (Andrew's) brief but severe encounter with intestinal distress.

Awoken early one morning with an extremely painful cramp that did not go away, our neighbor and fellow missionary Jim Sack drove me to the hospital and helped translate through the drawn-out diagnostic process. After an agonizing day and fears of surgery, the problem ended up resolving itself without medical intervention! This being Japan, however, I was kept for several more days under close observation. Thanks to all of you who added your prayers in my hour of need!

New Seminarists

We welcomed three new seminary students this Fall, one of whom is on the ordination track. It's an improvement over certain recent years, but hardly adequate to sustain the school, let alone maintain the church's current pastoral needs—to say nothing of expanding its ministry. Students are overwhelmed by ten or even twelve classes per week, in addition to field work and spiritual direction. And perhaps most tragic, the small numbers rob them of the kind of fellowship and camaraderie that could support them.

Our nine seminary faculty are certainly equal to the task; if anything, they are painfully underutilized, teaching classes of two or three most of the time. Everybody realizes the problem but finds it difficult to change course. We've had the same basic curriculum for well over fifty years, which, while impressively thorough on paper, in practice lacks traction in a world that has been radically transformed by the ongoing economic and demographic bust. Revisions are underway, but it's especially painful in Japanese culture, which greatly honors tradition. We certainly don't want to skimp on quality or thoroughness, but something must be done. Please pray for our success!

Small Group Ministries

Lutherans in the Strangest Places

I'm continuing to explore the pervasive presence of Johann Sebastian Bach in Japan, and encouraging our Lutheran church here to leverage its connection with Japan's most famous Lutheran. The reality is that church musicians are not paid in Japan, or very little. Church music is considered "service." While admirable for survival, it makes it difficult to develop a robust musical ministry. Interest in good organ music is certainly not lacking:

For example, this (right) is the "Bach Hall" in Naka-shinnden, Miyagi prefecture.



And here (left), at the Grand Bach Hotel in Sendai, an ornamented with a pipe organ. Our school's nascent "Bach Research Society" finally has some tentative plans for an event or two. Sarah's pastoral colleague Matsumoto-sensei has recently published a new trans-

lation of Luther's hymns. These include the famous chorales on the catechism, which are the foundation for the third book of Bach's Clavierübung. Bach's profound musical commentary on Christian doctrine is something, I think, we can meaningfully and helpfully exegete, not only for faithful Japanese churchgoers, but also for the multitude of Japanese fans of Bach who are drawn to the music's spiritual power but don't yet understand its deep underpinnings. Luke 12:22-34

Our lives give us plenty to worry about.

Sometimes we worry about whether we have enough, or whether there will be enough to get us through to the next paycheck. Other times we worry about whether we are good enough, whether we measure up, whether we are valued by others. We worry about our children -- about their future, about their wellbeing -- no matter their age. We worry about our country, our church, where we are headed.

In this Scripture, Jesus gives us the antidote to our worry. He assures us that we are of great value to God. If God values us, we can be assured that we measure up. If God values us, we needn't worry whether other people do. And because God values us, God will provide us with everything we need. We don't need to worry about whether we will have enough.

Jesus encourages us not to worry, reminding us that we can't add a single hour to our life by doing so. Every minute we spend worrying about the future or dwelling on the past is a minute we miss living our lives in the here and now.

Jesus encourages us to give our worries to God, and instead invest our time and energy in striving for God's kingdom. When we do this, we can put our worries aside, because we know God is in charge and we aren't. This is the greatest comfort of all.

For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Romans 3:38-39)



These verses from Romans are among my favorites in all of Scripture. The assurances in these words are comforting beyond words. However, I am human, as are the clients I sit with each day, and I must confess that although I love and rely upon the unshakable promise of these verses, I sometimes lose sight of the truth of them when life gets “too big.”

I have a Russian nesting doll on my desk in my office. This doll is a set of seven figures of decreasing sizes, each able to be stacked into the next so that all fit together inside of the largest doll. The tiniest doll in the set is less than an inch tall. Cute, but very small. Vulnerable. A reminder of how one may feel when life gets “too big.”

The outer layers of my nesting doll keep the small, vulnerable one safe. But what happens if something happens to those outer layers? What if a doctor ran a test which revealed something new and frightening? A layer cracks. What if one’s marriage has crumbled? More cracks. What if I have been betrayed by a trusted loved one? What if a child has died? Layers shatter, sometimes never to be repaired.

Although these verses from Romans do not protect us from the periodic cracking and shattering of the layers that hold us in this life, they remind me of the foundational certainty that grounds our faith. God, the very largest layer of our life’s nesting doll, is always intact, and always rock solid. God, and God alone, is capable of holding us, in all of our smallness and with all of our cracked and shattered layers. We may even discover that God is also that layer of our nesting doll that is closest to us, besides being the layer that is big enough to contain all that our lives hold. No matter how many cracks there are, and how vulnerable and small we feel at times, there is nothing that will be able separate us from the care of our Lord and Savior. Thanks be to God.

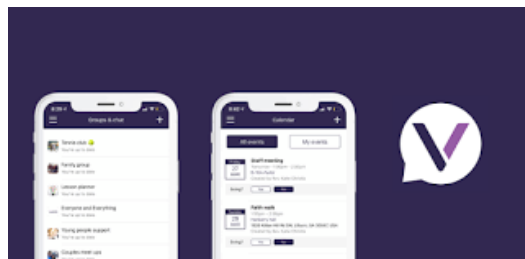
