From the Desk of Pastor Vaswig

Yes, believe it or not, Lent will soon be upon us. On February 22, we will begin the forty days with Ash Wednesday services both at noon and 7:00 p.m. for everyone's convenience. This year for the evening worship we will be joined by the people of God from Spirit of Peace as Pastor Jenn Hagedorn and myself will co-preside at the evening worship.

In addition to the Ash Wednesday worship, we will be conducting five mid-week services on Wednesdays during the Lenten season, each at 7:00 p.m. preceded by a soup supper. The theme for the five mid-week services will be Pondering the Psalms, the prayer book of the church. We will examine five different Psalms during the five weeks, applying the same Psalms to our daily lives. Lent is considered a season of renewal but also a season in which we examine our own lives of faith and consider deeply what it means to be a person of faith.

The Psalms are very helpful in this examination as the Psalmist struggles to tell the truth at whatever stage of the journey. While the Psalmist can indicate sheer joy coupled with profound gratitude, he also can lament the absence of God and cry out from a place of despondency. The Psalms in their prayerful tone speak profoundly to our lives and are a wonderful tool to enable us to keep Lent, if you will. So I hope you will keep Lent.

I hope you will mark your calendars for February 22, Ash Wednesday, followed by five successive Wednesdays where we will live into the Psalms as we embark on the journey of Lent. A most blessed Lenten journey.





From the Bishop:

When I was in sixth grade, my teacher decided that we were going to build chicken skeletons. From real chickens. So, the teacher divided us into groups. A local farmer donated the chickens. Each group had to boil and boil and boil their chicken. When all the flesh and tendons, etc. were boiled off, and the bones were clean, then we had to build the chicken back up so that it formed a complete bird.

When I think back on this project, I wonder what we were learning. Anatomy? Names of bones? I'm not sure. But what I did learn was community, relationship, and collaboration. Without the people in my group – and the different skills and gifts that they had – we would not have been able to put this chicken back together. We had to make sure that the bones were sorted into the right boxes (the feet bones, the leg bones, the wing bones, the beak, etc.) We had to make sure the bones weren't wet and that there wasn't anything left on the bones so it didn't stink. (My mom claimed it did stink. Side note, I was elected to bring home the completed chicken. My mom was not pleased and at some point, it disappeared from the living room bookcase).

Anyway, getting back to community, relationship, and collaboration . . . as I think of our synod, and what God is calling us to do and to be together, I think that these three things are key. I know that many of you are already in relationship and collaboration with other ELCA congregations around you. Perhaps you share your building with other ministries. Perhaps you share a food bank or work with a school. Perhaps affordable housing is part of your collaborative work. Many of you have preschools. All of these are wonderful ways to collaborate.

I'm wondering if we can think even bigger and more relationally than that. What if people from geographically close congregations met and talked about who they are. What their hopes are. What their fears are. What they need from others. What they have to offer others. What might come out of these conversations and relationships? Perhaps a way to share staff? Perhaps a way to be more impactful in the community? Perhaps new ways of using property? I'm not sure. It would be interesting and exciting to find out.

As I have mentioned before, study after study indicates that pastors today are lonely and feel isolated and anxious about the future. As my staff and I travel around the synod, we hear that many congregations also feel lonely and isolated and anxious about the future.

Northwest Washington Synod

Hearing stories and knowing some of the difficulties, doesn't it seem that it would be better to build relationship with one another and collaborate rather than every congregation trying to figure it out on their own?

Here are three ways that we are encouraging congregations to be in community, build relationships, and collaborate.

First, we continue to expand the LiVE Project (Living into Vocational Engagement). We are excited about the synod's collaboration and building relationship with the Trinity Education Foundation who is contributing funding this year and partnering with us. I encourage you to visit www.lutheransnw.org/ministries/the-live-project and learn more.

Second, in lieu of a Synod Assembly this year, we are hosting two Synod Gatherings in the spring with forums where relationships and collaboration are key. Watch for information in early February on the two Gatherings (May 13 in Mount Vernon and May 20 in Bellevue) via email and on our website here: www.lutheransnw.org/events/synod-gatherings.

Third, the Grace Grant application this year asks applicants with whom they are collaborating on the proposed project. The application process is open February 1–May 31. Read about the focus areas and how to apply for this final year of funding here: www.lutheransnw.org/pages/grace-grants.

You know, I could never have built that chicken alone. Nor would I have wanted to. Truthfully, even with my group, it was messy and hard. In my memory, we had a few bones left over that we quietly threw in the garbage. And yet, I am still in relationship with many of the people in my sixth grade group. And we are bonded from the chicken-building experience.

Faith and Everyday Life February 2023

Uphold me according to your promise, that I may live, and let me not be put to shame in my hope.

(Psalm 119:116)



I've been reflecting on the rigidities of habits, thoughts, and behaviors that distract us from keeping the law. . . . From properly giving to God what is God's. So often what I see, both in myself and in my therapy clients, is that when we fail to do the right thing or when we choose to do the wrong thing, it is often not so much a motivation issue as it is a transportation problem. Let me explain.

There are many parts of our Self that help us make decisions, run a life, pursue excellence or joy, and love well and deeply. Perhaps you've noticed that sometimes, when you talk to yourself about how to proceed in a given situation, the internal dialogue will sound something like "Part of me thinks . . . and another part of me wonders . . . and then, another part of me just wants . . . "

In the absence of severe chemical imbalance or mental illness, these parts of Self are a normal, natural part of an adult personality. And different parts of the Self take different roles at different times in different settings. So, for example, normally and naturally, when we're playing a game we love, the part of us that is curious and loves games will take leadership.

One way to look at our challenges in keeping covenant with our God is to think about what part of us takes leadership in what areas of our life. I encourage you to think and pray with me today and in the upcoming days about the part of you that leads you in the Good. Think about the areas of your life where you are performing well: where you are proud of your actions, your ethical stance, and the way you love. Now think about the parts of your life where there are challenges for you in right living, in ethical thinking, and behavior. Perhaps you avoid the pain by choosing an easy path.

What you're experiencing in these places of challenge might be seen as a problem in transporting the part of your Self you need to the situation at hand. This could be a moment to prayerfully ask God: What part of me do I need to take charge in this situation? And then to ask God to strengthen this part, encourage this part to take leadership. And perhaps to ask God to curb the tendencies of a part that tends to take charge and lead you astray. In this way, you pray with the psalmist, "Uphold me according to your promise, that I may live, and let me not be put to shame in my hope."
