From the Desk of Pastor Vaswig

In keeping with past years, this newsletter will encompass both the months of July and August, including some of the events scheduled for the fall. As we proceed into the summer months, we give thanks for our life together and the ministry we conduct in the name of Jesus Christ. If you are traveling this summer, may it be a source of relaxation and inspiration. If you are in town, we as a worshipping community do not take the summer off so I look forward to seeing you in worship.

In the month of August, we will have our lake time on August 9, 16, and 23, gathering at 5:30 p.m. We have invited our partners in the Gospel, Spirit of Peace UCC, to join us, and Pastor Jenn will be conducting the worship time on the August 23. The fellowship we have together as we gather around the beauty of Lake Sammamish is always a source of joy and peace. I look forward to seeing you all on the lake.

In the fall I am planning on teaching two separate classes; this all assumes, of course, that the call process is not complete. On Sunday mornings at 9:00 a.m., I will be teaching the Gospel of St. Mark. It is the shortest of the Gospels by far and really cuts to the heart of the Gospel: no birth narrative, genealogy, or "Word became flesh" at the beginning of Mark. Rather, he simply states in Chapter 1:1, "The beginning of the Good News of Jesus Christ." Wham. So we will probe Mark's sixteen chapters beginning on Sunday, September 10 at 9:00 a.m. as we celebrate our life together with New Beginnings Sunday.

Additionally, in the fall we will once again be meeting for lunch and study, moving the day to Thursday versus Wednesday at noon since some have indicated scheduling conflicts on Wednesday. So at noon on Thursday, September 14, we will be examining the book of Colossians, a simply wonderful book indicating the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

From the Bishop:

As I write this, I am still reliving a beautiful experience that I had last weekend. Five of my friends and I drove to the Gorge Amphitheatre, and we saw Joni Mitchell in concert. For some of you, this might be interesting; for others, you might not even know who Joni Mitchell is. For me, the time was filled with joy, laughter, tears, friendship, and community . . . not to mention Bishop Shelley Bryan Wee amazing music and storytelling.

But this isn't about Joni Mitchell . . . at least not entirely. For what struck me as I sat on the grass with 26,000 other people was the church-like feeling that was there. Or perhaps I should say the "Jesus-y" feeling that was there. Or maybe the Holy Spirit-inaction feeling. And this came from the crowd itself.

As we all sat crowded together on blankets and chairs, people told stories, shared food and drink, sang songs, helped those who were having difficulty navigating the hillside, and together we became community. The little children sitting to the right of me danced, the young girls sitting to the left of me accepted blankets from my friend, and the man in front of me told me that he had traveled from North Carolina to see Joni. He told me that he was surprised to discover the Gorge was not located in Seattle!

There was one point in the concert, after it had gotten dark, when Joni was singing and people—one by one—started shining the flashlight from their cellphones towards the stage. Throughout the crowd, little points of light lit up the darkness. Now, if you have been to a concert in the last ten years, this is a common occurrence. Cell phone lights have taken the place of lighters being raised. However, because Joni has not performed in over twenty years, she was bemused by the lights. She turned to the person next to her on stage and said, "It looks like a fallen constellation. Where did they get all those lights?"

I thought her words and her surprise were charming. But as I looked around me, at the people sharing blankets, at those with arms around each other swaying to the music, at the cozy darkness around us and the lights looking like fallen stars, it was more than charming. It was holy.

For a moment, we were a cathedral. For a moment, we were community. For a moment, we were one.

At our best, this is what it means to be church. To be the Body of Christ. To practice hospitality and generosity, and grace. To see Christ in one another. To accept others' limitations and to be accepting of our own.

I confess that all was not perfect at the Gorge. There was a person close to me who insisted on singing every word to every song. While her voice was fine, I was not there to hear her but to hear Joni. There were people who cut in line after we had been waiting two hours to get inside. There was a driver who bullied his way into the front of the very long line of vehicles as we were leaving.

Perhaps this is like church, too. At least church as a human construction. Those of us who have been part of a church for a while, we know that church is not always sharing blankets and food, singing and joy. Sometimes, as humans, we hoard our stuff. We take offense at others. We refuse to listen. We bully. We push. Our voices sometimes drown out other voices.

And yet . . . I pray that the moments of grace we receive this summer—from music at the Gorge to singing lustily in church, from sharing food on a hillside to receiving the body and blood of Christ—may we be church together. May we know and make it known that all are fully loved by God—in the times when we are like fallen constellations and in the times we are not.

May your summer be filled with holy moments.

Faith and Everyday Life July 2023

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. (Hebrews 11:1)



Hope is essential in order for humans to thrive. Yet, hope can be hard to come by at times. I know this firsthand through the many very personal griefs and sorrows shared in my counseling office. Relationships fail. Loved ones die. Dreams are lost. Chronic illness robs quality of life.

What is hope, anyway? Is it related to the joy and gratitude that can be found when the sun comes out on a beautiful northwest day, or when our life circumstances flow together without much difficulty, or when we sing the Hallelujah Chorus with vigor on Easter Sunday? Yes, certainly. The hope we feel in such moments is real and sustaining, and provides a foreshadowing of our heavenly hope for a time when sorrow will be no more.

Sometimes, however, I think hope is a far grittier thing, and something hard won. Sometimes we barely cling to hope by our fingernails, as we feel tossed about in a sea of emotional turmoil or personal trials. Sometimes hope eludes us entirely during our darkest days, and we may need of the support of someone who can hold onto hope for us when we cannot.

Each year when we tire of the dark and gloomy days of northwest rain that seem to last for months, we may also recall that the sun is literally just behind the clouds. It can't be seen yet, and it may yet be a while until it makes its appearance. However, it *is* there, and it is more stalwartly constant than the clouds which occupy our vision.

If you are living amidst a lingering time of dark clouds, and have forgotten what the sun looks and feels like, please know that the sun is still present. And may we as the community of faith remember and hold onto that hope for those among us who at this time cannot. Amen.

Surely there is a future, and your hope will not be cut off. (Proverbs 23: 18)



When couples come to therapy, things can look awfully bleak. There may be intense conflict that has raged for years. There may be resigned distance. There is often lack of hope that change is possible.

But something has brought them in that door. Some glimmer of hope that things could be different. It is that glimmer of hope that lights the way to change in therapy.

Whether we use the name of Christ in the therapy room or not, Christ is present in that glimmer of hope. Christ points the way to change. Christ helps couples begin to understand each other and risk lowering their protections with one another. Christ helps them reveal their true feelings, and opens them to experiencing each other differently.

It can be this way for each of us. Trusting in Christ, we can receive and embrace that glimmer of hope that things could be different. We can trust Christ to light our way, and begin step by step to embrace change, lower our protections, and reach out to others. We can begin to take risks and have new experiences. In all of this, Christ is present, leading us forward, guiding our steps, helping us change and grow toward a future full of hope.
