Greetings to you all in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

When each of you receive this newsletter, it will be between the Reformation Festival and the Festival of All Saints. I have really enjoyed over the years these back-to-back Sundays, with one always following the other. While Reformation Day is on October 31, we always celebrate it on the Sunday closest in proximity. Likewise, with All Saints Day which is on November 1, we always celebrate on the Sunday nearest to the day.

The beauty of the back-to-back is first we celebrate and recognize as Lutheran Christians our theological heritage with Luther's discovery of a compelling grace made known in faith. We confess a Trinitarian faith where the varying members of the Trinity are in relationship with each other, much like we are called to be in relationship with our sisters and brothers across the street and across the world.

So, yes, we commemorate the day of Reformation and the reinvigoration of the church, just as we give thanks for Christ's holy church on earth and all of its expressions. A most blessed All Saints Sunday and Happy Thanksgiving to you all.

Treasurer's Update for September 2023

Here are the numbers for September. What do they say? Well, they say that we are not as healthy as we had hoped.

Our new budget began on July 1. We were excited because giving for July was exceptionally good. August was not so good, but when combined with July we were still on track for our budgeted giving.

Then came September. Maybe it is just a glitch. Maybe lots of people left town for the month. (Because monthly attendance records show not as many people were coming to church.) But, frankly, giving in September was bad.

We need \$26,250 each month to meet our approved budget. In September we received only \$18,759. Year-to-date (July-September) we are below budgeted giving by almost \$8,000! Not to spread total panic—we are still under the budgeted spending! So, we are not "in the hole," and we have not had to access our reserves.

But, let me take this opportunity to say this is a concern. We are on the cusp of placing a call to a new pastor. The September financials, only 3 months into our current fiscal year, makes me wonder if we can actually afford to call and support a long-term pastor. Yes, we are one of the fortunate congregations that has some reserves—thanks to the gift we received from Shepherd of the Hills in the merger—but those reserves will only carry us 2-4 years with this current giving pattern.

You have often heard me say, "The budget we approve each year is only a guideline." And, I never forget that we are a people of faith, trusting that God will provide for our needs. But, we also need to be a practical people (there's that Lutheran "both/and" again!). The budget is also a measuring stick by which to measure progress or its opposite.

I often find it difficult to pray for someone/something if I don't have something specific for which to pray. How about you? Might it be that giving suffers from the same commitment: it is much easier to give when there is a specific need?

Please consider the Our Savior Lutheran Church budget to be that specific need. The budget covers the care and maintenance of our building (at one time called the "house of God"). The budget covers the care and maintenance of our chosen staff to preach

and teach and keep things running smoothly. The budget covers the care and maintenance of our internal and external outreach through groups like Congregational Care, Community Outreach, Global Missions, and the ELCA. Do you give regularly to Our Savior Lutheran Church to support this budget? When was the last time you increased your giving?

Good, good things are happening at Our Savior Lutheran Church! It is a very exciting time as we are soon to be moving out of the "transition" phase into a new calling, a new life, and new adventures. Come, join us in worship, bring a friend, fill the pews on Sunday morning, and let's raise our voices in song and praise. Come, fill the offering basket (or electronic giving) with monetary gifts, signs of thanks and praise to God for all His goodness and bounty to us as individuals and for this worshipping, thriving congregation. Come, offer your hands in service and healing to each other and our local and global communities. You are called.

Our Savior Community From the Parish Administrator

October 18 was my 1st work anniversary at OSLC. It's amazing to believe I've been here a year already! I want to thank you for supporting, guiding, and including me in your church life. As I've created bulletins and newsletters, attended adult education classes, enjoyed desserts with the Mission Quilters, learned how things work around here, and gotten to meet and know many of you, it's been a growth-filled year. I look forward to serving and getting to know you more this upcoming year.

Here are some transitions underway at church. Please stay tuned for updates.

- In the next week or so we'll begin the process of transitioning away from using key cards to using individual, unique access codes to enter the church through Anderson Hall's electronic door lock. This will afford greater security since we have many key cards that have been lost or not returned by users over the years. Gary Hanson, Rick West, and I are working to prepare the lock with access codes so the key card access can be shut off. When the codes are ready, I'll send out an email asking you to bring your key card to the OSLC office so I can give you your new unique access code. All church members, friends, and outside users presently using key cards will be notified in time to get their access code before key cards are shut off. (If you currently use the universal access code—the one code that's been in place for many years—you'll need to get a unique access code.) No one needing access will be locked out. New users needing church access should get in touch with me to get an access code assigned. All users of the electronic lock will have instructions available to use the keypad. Please do not share your access code with others. We hope to complete this transition by December 1st to provide better security at OSLC.
- As of November 1, Mighty-N-Tidy Commercial Cleaning will start as OSLC's new cleaning service. Mighty-N-Tidy will clean the church on Friday evenings and after large events. Peter Ruelas, the owner, reassured Chuck Bachman and me that he and his team enjoy cleaning churches and will do a thorough, professional job here. We discussed detailed cleaning tasks and working together on proper recycling and trash removal (and hopefully composting in the near future).
- Since receiving emails from Recology two months ago about OSLC's recycling bin being contaminated with trash, I've been communicating with Lauren Herber, Waste Zero Specialist at Recology King County (our garbage and recycling provider). On September 21, Lauren met here with OSLC members (representing Council, Altar Guild, Community Meals/kitchen users, and Buildings and Grounds) as well as Spirit of Peace members. We discussed best recycling practices; what cups and plates are compostable (and hoping to buy those items for church use); composting service; and new containers, better signage, and education of church members and groups (so it's easier to know what item goes where). We want to be better stewards of God's earth. On November 1, Lauren will bring recycling and composting signage to OSLC. I'm committed moving this project forward.

From the Bishop:

In the song "Amazing Grace" we sing, "I once was lost but now I'm found."

Because my job sometimes involves travel, there are times when I am wandering unfamiliar airports—trying to find my flight, trying to find edible food, trying to find a place to charge my phone, trying to find a place where there isn't a cacophony of sound and crowds of people. And sometimes at airports I also experience a feeling like a disconnection from my "self." Sometimes I am wandering the airport trying to find my "self."

Strangely, there are moments at airports where I get this feeling as though I am unmoored from what connects me to other people. Honestly, I don't know if this is something only I experience or if others feel the same way.

There have been a slew of recent articles and social media posts written about how churches are dying and pastors are leaving and people are upset and no one goes to church anymore and so on. These posts are hard to read, and I wonder—is this a sign that we are feeling unmoored? That we are searching for something? Or maybe it is simply being lost.

In the gospel of Luke, Jesus tells two parables — one about a lost sheep and one about a lost coin (Luke 15:1-10). You probably remember these parables—the shepherd leaves the ninety-nine in search of the one. The woman turns over her entire house for the one coin that is missing from her purse. I think that traditionally we hear these parables as Jesus searching for the one who needs to hear the good news of Jesus for the very first time. But I think that is a misreading. The lost lamb was a part of the shepherd's flock. The lost coin was in the woman's purse. This story is for insiders. For those who know and yet have gotten lost.

This lostness might be of one's own volition. The sheep wanders from the prescribed pasture. But it can also be something that just happens. A coin cannot, on its own, get lost. We have all experienced the disruption of the pandemic, the cracks in our government, the warming of our climate causing suffering and death, and so much more. We notice changes in our churches and in our families and in our communities. Many of us have experienced personal troubles and tragedies. These all can lead to a sense of feeling adrift. And it can lead to fractures in our church community and our faith life.

However, the circumstance comes about—because of one's own actions or because of something that descends upon us—lostness occurs. And even when we know God's love and grace and comfort, even when we know that community is important, even when we are already part of God's community and church, we can still feel unmoored, lose our sense of belonging, our capacity to trust. We can get so lost that we don't know who we are or whose we are or where we belong anymore.

I don't know where you are at as you read this article today. Perhaps you are feeling snug with the other ninety-nine in the sheepfold of God. Perhaps you are a coin cozy with the other nine coins. But perhaps you are not. Perhaps you, too, are wondering and wandering. Perhaps you, too, are feeling disconnected from friends or family or your church community. Perhaps you, too, are wandering in Concourse C wondering how in the world you get to Concourse A. Perhaps you, too, are a sheep bleating for help or a coin under the couch cushions.

If this is you, the good news is that God is a searcher and a finder. The amazing news is that God is the shepherd hiking into the wilderness looking for you. The astounding news is that God is the housewife lighting her lamp and sweeping every corner in the house to find you. You are worth looking for. You are loved and desired. And when God finds you, there is rejoicing and laughter and a party! As Dan Erlander writes, "Love is God's action to bring us into abundant life—reconciled to God, to each other, and all creation!"

In the 2023-24 course offerings of the synod's LiVE Project there are many ways to be community together and the body of Christ together. There are ways to encourage and uplift one another. There are retreats, ongoing classes, and a year-long "Abide in the Word" Bible Study. (Learn more at https://www.lutheransnw.org/ministries/the-live-project) If you are feeling unmoored, lost, alone, adrift, I encourage you to first join in your community at your church, and second, to join in the offerings in the wider synod. We are church together. We are journeying together. We get lost, and we get found, together.

Together we sing, "We once were lost but now we're found."

ELCA Presiding Bishop Issues Statement on Israel-Hamas War

10/13/2023

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning?" Psalm 22:1

Dear church,

As Lutherans, we are accustomed to holding tension between two truths. Thus the ELCA denounces the egregious acts of Hamas, acts that have led to unspeakable loss of life and hope. At the same time the ELCA denounces the indiscriminate retaliation of Israel against the Palestinian people, both Christian and Muslim.

For the past week we have borne witness to the horrors of the escalating crisis between Israel and Hamas. We also watch a growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza as Israel blocks food, water, fuel and medical supplies and as airstrikes continue to cause unbearable civilian casualties ahead of a just-announced ground assault. We see Israelis and families around the world in the agonizing wait for word about the fate of loved ones killed or taken hostage by Hamas. We are in anguish, grieving and praying for all people who are living in trauma, fear and uncertainty.

Among us are Palestinian Lutherans who are fearful for their families, their communities and their homeland. In our communities we have Jewish and Muslim neighbors, who are also facing the horrors of this crisis and its impact on their loved ones.

It is difficult to find words that suffice in the complexity of this moment, and in the web of relationships that bind us together, as church, with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land and our interreligious partners. Yet God has called us to be a people who stand with others amid suffering.

We must also call a thing a thing. The power exerted against all Palestinian people—through the occupation, the expansion of settlements and the escalating violence—must be called out as a root cause of what we are witnessing. We are committed to our long-standing accompaniment of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land.

The God who liberates us calls us to be a liberating witness. May it be so.

Faith and Everyday Life November 2023

Why are you cast down, O my soul, and why are you disquieted within me? Hope in God; for I shall again praise him, my help and my God. (Psalm 42:11)

This verse describes a state of depression: cast down, disquieted within. The depressed person looks down, not up; his inner emotional state is disturbed, sad, and hopeless. In depression, there is a kind of giving up on life, of learned help-lessness.

Like other psalms, this passage is one that demonstrates the intersection of good psychology and good theology. We use the principles and strategies of psychology and medicine to treat depression. Sometimes we see relief of symptoms through cognitive therapy, grief and loss therapy, problem-solving, or healing of a relation-ship. Then there is positive psychology—what one writer has coined "learned optimism." It is revealed in the statement, "I shall again praise him, my help and my God." Good psychology, good theology!




