#### From the Council Co-President

Marilyn Carlson, John McDowell, Wendy Winslow, and I are the Executive Team from Council. One of our main tasks is dealing with church staff finances. I counted six Zoom meetings this month with another one today (November 30). Seven meetings are easily more than the entire year of gatherings. It's all about making things work for our upcoming vote on December 3 for a new pastor. Our final task is filling out the "Definition of Compensation, Benefits, and Responsibilities for Ministers of Word and Sacrament under Call." This incredibly long title matches the time and energy needed to fill it out.

I received the resignation letter from our last called pastor four and a half years ago. I had only been elevated to be the president for a month. "Lately it occurs to me, what a long strange trip it's been." These lyrics are from the Grateful Dead song "Truckin'" and are appropriate for this journey we all have been on at Our Savior Lutheran Church. So many members and attendees have stepped forward during this void to rebuild OSLC.

This coming Saturday at 10 a.m. come meet, greet, and listen to the candidates of choice. Some of you may have checked out the website of the candidates. Your best way to affirm the decision is to meet in person. Pastries and coffee will be provided.

On Sunday, December 10, we will have our Semi-Annual Congregational Meeting. We will vote on fixing up the parsonage and establishing a financial campaign to help pay for it. Hopefully, we will have a full slate of Council members to vote on. We still need a couple "at-large" members. It would be nice to have a full Council for the new pastor(s).

Lastly, assuming the votes are all positive, we will have a send-off for Pastor John Vaswig. We have been incredibly blessed to have him shepherd us in transition. I've heard some members say we need someone like John to occupy the pulpit. It won't happen. It is unfair to compare other preacher's sermons to Pastor Vaswig's dynamic sermons. These candidates will bring other strengths to help OSLC grow for the future.

#### **Treasurer's Update: October 2023**

Good news! Good news! We are **four** months into our current fiscal year (July 1-June 30), and I am pleased to report that after a questionable September we are back on track with our budget. We had planned for contributions of \$105,000 year-to-date and as of 10/31/2023 we have received \$105,613 in contributions. Isn't that awe-some? Here, in a nutshell:

The \$420,000 gift from Shepherd of the Hills remains untouched and is continuing to grow in dollars as it sits quietly waiting for its calling to action.

#### From the Parish Administrator

As we enter the month of December, it's a busy time at church and in the office as we prepare for Advent, Christmas, and the New Year. It feels like change and growth are on the horizon. Here are a few updates for you:

The changeover to individual access codes has had some challenges that are being resolved. For now, please continue to use your key card (or general access code) to enter the doors into Anderson Hall. I'll be in touch when new access codes are ready. Thanks for your patience.

The OSLC Council recently approved a new 9-page-long Facility Use Form that includes General Facility Use Policies and Requirements and a Facility Use Request Form. Marilyn Carlson, Wendy Carlson, Chuck Bachman, and I worked to update and standardize the policies, requirements, and fees for using rooms at OSLC. This form applies to outside groups or anyone who wants to rent OSLC rooms for a special event, recital, rehearsal, meeting space, funeral, wedding, etc. OSLC members having church meetings and church activities don't need to fill it out.

Camp Roberson (formerly Tent City 4): Yesterday (Nov. 30) I enjoyed visiting with the good folks at Camp Roberson. One resident had a large table piled high with evergreen boughs, ribbons, golden pinecones, wires, etc.; she was creating beautiful Christmas wreaths. She said she's been making wreaths her whole life. It's been great to get to know and laugh with some of our neighbors over the last several months.

The camp is now connected with Low Income Housing Institute (LIHI). They're preparing to move from OSLC's property—with LIHI's help—on or by December 31. Residents are excited because it sounds like LIHI's new site in Preston will be ready in time to welcome them at the end of December.

Since Camp Roberson (now 15 people) is still our neighbor through the month of December, I want to make sure we don't forget about them. They told me that their greatest needs are hand-warmers, bottled water, and blankets. Also, access to washers and dryers. Laundromats are expensive. For December they don't have a shower truck or laundry facilities onsite here (it will be set up at the new site), so they've been showering at the Snoqualmie YMCA and trying to figure out how to find less expensive places to wash their clothes. I'm thinking of bringing them a few rolls of quarters for laundry. Please drop any donations off at camp behind the church. Thanks.

#### From the Bishop:

We were in a car heading to the Sahara Desert. The weather was changing. I looked out the window and, seeing a dark mass in the distance, said to the driver, "Do you know what a tornado is?" He didn't respond. But in a few short moments, we skidded to a stop on the side of the road. There was no visibility, wind was swirling around us. Rain and sand and rocks were pelting the car. And then the car windows broke from the pressure of the storm. We were suddenly being blown around and all of us in the car were showered with rain and sand and

rocks and glass. We huddled in our seats, shocked by the ferociousness of the weather around us and fearful of what was happening.

When I look at our world right now, I confess I feel much the same as I did on that day - like I'm huddling in my seat, shocked by the ferociousness of the wind and fearful of what is happening.

In our world, the climate continues to change and people and the very earth are suffering. We continue to harm this planet that God created for us and for all creatures and plants.

In our Holy Land, as I write this in the middle of November, we hear of Palestinian Christian families fleeing, children crying, hunger and desperation, churches being bombed and hospitals being attacked. In our Holy Land, we hear of violence against the Jewish people, kidnapping of children and old people, and the threat of death.

In our country, there are those who are conflating Christianity with patriotism, those who are moving against Democracy and towards authoritarianism, gun violence continues unabated, legislators refuse to do their work and instead look after their own best interests. There is continued racism in our institutions, polarization, refusal to listen to each other, and more.

In the ELCA, we forget that we are gathering for the sake of Jesus and for those desperate to hear God's Word of forgiveness, love, and grace. We try to prop up institutional ideas rather than living into the Spirit of Christ. We would rather live in the "what once was" rather than the advent of something beyond our imaginations (but not God's).

Truly, the storms seem strong and fierce.

And yet ... and yet ...

In this time, when we not only are living in these swirling squalls, we are called, as people of faith, to remember and trust how God has worked, and continues to work, in this world. We are called to tell the stories of God's faithfulness again. For in the beginning, through God's Word, chaos became the heavens and the earth. Later, Moses saw God in fire. In the story of Job, when Job questioned God's faithfulness, God replied, referring to the stars, 'Can you bind the chains of the Pleiades, or loose the cords of Orion?' When Abraham fought the storm of sacrificing his son, God brought through the darkness a ram. When a country was occupied by Rome, power was held by a few, voices were silenced, and hope seemed fleeting, a young girl became pregnant and sang. A young couple sought shelter far from home.

In a night of storms, one star shone bright. In a world of desolation, a baby's cry was heard.

In this stormy time, in this time of deep shadows and unknowns, in this time of memory and hope, in this Advent and Christmas time, together we lift our voices and sing:

#### From the VEEP:

"Do not fear, for I am with you; do not be afraid, for I am your God; I will strengthen you; I will help you." Isaiah 41:10

I was discussing world events with a friend recently, and she remarked that she keeps thinking things can't get any worse, and then the world proves her wrong. Terrorism, war, mass shootings, unparalleled storms, a pandemic that just won't die; everywhere we turn, we are confronted with terrible tidings. Hatred and anger and violence and injustice seem to rule the day. It is no wonder, then, that every report the synod council receives from Bishop Shelley begins with concerns over the anxiety

and fear that appear to be seeping into so many aspects of personal and congregational lives. How can we break this downward spiral? How do we stop being afraid? How do we stop doomscrolling?

I suggest we begin love-scrolling instead. God reminds us many times throughout scripture not to fear, and we are told, indeed, that that "there is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear." (1 John 4:18) Therefore, when I am anxious or afraid, I look for love. I see love in the gentle touch of a parent wiping away a child's tears. I see it in friends bringing meals to someone in crisis. I see it in teachers bringing snacks to class to ensure no student has to learn on an empty stomach. I see it in the hands that knit and crochet and sew warm blankets, hats, and scarves for those who are unhoused in bad weather. I see it in the neighbor who mows the lawn of the elderly couple next door. I see it in a grandchild patiently explaining how to get the Zoom working for the umpteenth time. I see it in the people who regularly give blood. I see it in those risking life and limb to bring humanitarian aid to war zones. I see it in the spouse who learns to make gluten/dairy/egg-free chicken and dumplings for their food sensitive partner. I see it in the great-grandparent who moves across the country for six months to help with childcare. I see it in all those who give of their time and talents to serve others. Where do you see love?

During the season of Advent, we prepare to celebrate the fact that "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." (John 3:16) That makes it the perfect time to be on the lookout for that perfect love that casts out fear.

After all, in the words of poet Christina Rossetti:

Love came down at Christmas,

Love all lovely, love divine;

Love was born at Christmas,

Star and angels gave the sign.



Jesus, then, is "love incarnate, love divine." What love could be more perfect than that? May your Advent season be blessed with love-scrolling and tidings of great joy.

## Published November 29 in the November/December Update from Advocacy Connections:

IN TIME OF WAR: As weeks extend in the temporarily paused Isael-Hamas war, faith leaders continue to urge peace. Signed by the Rev. Elizabeth Eaton, ELCA presiding bishop, several ELCA synod bishops and others through Churches for Middle East Peace, a Nov. 29 <a href="Letter">Letter</a> to President Biden says, "We condemn all acts of violence against civilians and grieve with Israelis and Palestinians who have lost loved ones." It urges: "You have a unique opportunity to turn the tide of history and finally demand that the fighting stop and that the parties involved resolve their differences through negotiations and diplomatic means. Please do not miss this opportunity. Millions of lives depend on the U.S., no longer being complicit in an unjust war that has already devastated the lives of thousands of civilians. Our prayers are with you in the days and weeks to come. We ask that God give you wisdom and courage to do all you can to bring an end to the killing and the violence."

Our ELCA advocacy continues to urge Congress and the Administration to: 1) Publicly call for a ceasefire to prevent the further loss of life; 2) Prioritize the protection of all civilians, including by urgently securing the entrance of humanitarian aid into Gaza and working to secure the release of hostages and prisoners; and 3) Urge all parties to fully respect international humanitarian law.


