

TO HOPE AND ACT WITH CREATION

SEASON OF CREATION 2024

The firstfruits of hope (Rom 8:19-25)

Worldwide Movement

Each year from September 1 to October 4, the Christian family unites for this worldwide celebration of prayer and action to protect our common home. It is a special season where we celebrate God as Creator and acknowledge Creation as the divine continuing act that summons us to love and care for all that is created. We are co-creatures and part of all that God has made. Our well-being is interwoven with the well-being of the Earth.

This year the theme for the Season is "To hope and act with Creation." Amid the triple planetary crisis of climate change, biodiversity loss, and pollution, many are beginning to despair and suffer from eco-anxiety. As people of faith, we are called to uplift hope, the hope of renewed life, the hope of resurrection. This is not a hope without action, but one embodied in concrete actions of prayer and preaching, service and solidarity.

Projects for Issaquah, WA:

Labyrinth of Lanterns: A Community Art Installation

In Issaquah, Our Savior Lutheran Church (OSLC) and the non-profit Issaquah Arts have partnered up to provide opportunities to encourage hope and action for Christians and non-Christians alike. As a visible sign for hope, we will create a temporary labyrinth on the meadow in the back of the church building. Starting now, restaurants and businesses are *Continued on page 2...*

invited to collect industrial-sized cans. In workshops offered all over Issaquah, these cans will be transformed into lanterns. The lanterns will be the joints of the labyrinth. The bones of the labyrinths will be shaped by garlands and foraged materials. Workshops will be offered in which people can learn how to make these out of locally sourced materials. All are invited to participate in creating the labyrinth. From Saturday, September 21 until Sunday, October 6, the labyrinth is accessible to all during daytime. The lanterns will be lit every night from 7:00-9:00 p.m.

Walking the labyrinth is a meditative technique which helps us to quiet our minds. Oftentimes people focus on a spiritual question or a specific prayer. While walking towards the center of the labyrinth, we can practice focusing on the specific question or prayer. By walking out of the labyrinth, we can practice applying that specific question or prayer to our lives.

Resident Artist and Art Workshops

From September 4 to October 4, fiber artist Janice King will be resident artist in an atelier (art studio/workshop) in the OSLC building. She will be working on the project, *Trees of Memory Future*. King connects art with the natural elements of a place to deepen connection, understanding and experience in life. *Trees of Memory Future* imagines trees of the Northwest in the future—a future in which we have either managed to avert climate catastrophe, or in which climate catastrophe is threatening our very lives and the lives of our trees.

During this month, more artists will offer workshops with a focus on art rooted in nature. These workshops will provide us with fresh ideas about how we can respectfully connect with nature and make better use of many materials which we all too often classify as 'trash.'

Be part of the Season of Creation in Issaquah!

All events are open to the public; most are free of charge. There is a charge for the workshops requiring registration.

THE ARTS SALUTION LANGERIS

A labyrinth is an ancient walking meditation that helps people find themselves and connect to the source of life, however you name this source. A labyrinth is not a maze. You cannot get lost. The labyrinth is a path that always leads you to its center.

There is no right or wrong way to walk a labyrinth. It's a journey that takes you from where you are to the center. You take the experience of the center with you as you walk out of the labyrinth again. Even though you end your journey at the same location, it is not the same place from where you started.

There are many metaphors for describing the practice of walking a labyrinth; spiritual journey, walking meditation, moving prayer, recharging the soul, agent of change, crucible of wisdom, well of inspiration, just to name a few.

TRY IT AND SEE WHAT IT MEANS TO YOU

BEFORE YOU ENTER

Take a moment to get ready for the journey. Ask your higher power for wisdom and courage to follow the path to the center. Slowly breathe in and out and explore the sensation of the power of life flowing into you, nourishing you and empowering you. As the breath leaves your body let it carry with it all that burdens and troubles you.

WALKING IN

Enter the labyrinth and explore the pace that feels right to you. Try to calm your mind as you walk. Be the step you take. Be the breath that feeds you and that cleanses you. Try to release the cacophony of noise that vies for your attention and walk toward the calm of the center. Oftentimes, your mind doesn't quiet at the first try. If you get distracted, release that thought and focus on your next steps and breaths again. Use the steps you take, the rhythm of your walk, as guide toward calmness.

CENTER

You have arrived at the center. Stay as long or as short as feels right. Listen to the world around you and the voices that come from deep within. Maybe a whisper brings words of wisdom to you. Maybe the wisdom lies in questions, rather than answers.

WALKING OUT

Explore the pace that feels right as you journey back into the world. Carry the experience of the center with you. Breath in and let the experience connect you to the source of life. Exhale and as the air leaves your body let it carry with it all that separates you from the source of life.

EXIT

Be reborn as you take the last step and finish this journey. You have emerged from the labyrinth. Take a moment to recount the experience of walking toward the center and back. You have emerged changed. Explore the changes as you embrace daily life again.


Congratulations!

She was a lifelong advocate for her own Nisqually people and other Salish tribes and a leader in advocating for Indigenous education, the preservation of Indigenous history, and the revitalization of Nisqually culture, spirituality, and arts.

2024 is a year of many celebrations and anniversaries: the 120th anniversary of the 1854 Medicine Creek Treaty, the 100th anniversary of the 1924 Native American Voting Rights Act, the 50th anniversary of the 1974 Boldt Decision, the 20th anniversary of the exoneration of Chief Leschi in 2004, and what would have been the 100th birthday of Nisqually historian and PLU alumna Cecelia Svinth Carpenter."

The Spirit: September 2024



You might have noticed that we are in the middle of another election season. The rhetoric, the tone, the attempts to vilify and amplify are all around us - coming from candidates and superPACs and social media and neighbors and family and more.

You might wonder where does faith fit into all of this?

As Lutherans, we believe that God loves and values every sin-Bishop Shelley Bryan Wee gle person. This means all are beloved of God - even those who we might not agree with or even like. All are God's chil-

dren. This means that even those who are the farthest from our political views are humans and worthy of care. Further, as Martin Luther once said, we are called to be little Christs for one another. This means listening and wanting the best for one another.

In saying this, please know that loving one another is not the same as remaining quiet in the presence of hate speech or abusive actions. There are times to speak up and engage. As we know from the prophets and from Jesus, we are called to work and to speak out against powers and systems that have historically marginalized or silenced so many of God's beloved people.

So I ask again, where does faith fit into all of this?

Well ... If you are full of anxiety for this coming year, if you wonder how to engage with others on issues that you care about, if you want to help foster a sense of community and love, we invite you and your congregation to join Northwest Washington Synod's LiVE Project. This coming year LiVE is engaging faith and life with new classes, retreats, and cohorts. This year's theme is Faith Out Loud. The 2024-25 offerings are chosen explicitly to address how to engage faith and life. This fall there is a multiweek class on Faith in Public Life starting on September 18. On October 19 there is a one-day retreat on Christian Nationalism. And from October 21-November 9 there will be an election prayer vigil. Further out in the year there is a retreat on land use, embracing difference, and a Lenten Journey along with other cohorts and more.

Together with what is happening in each of the individual congregations throughout the synod, LiVE is providing ways for people to share their faith stories, listen to one another, and connect with God and with one another to live their faith out loud.

LiVE is a place where people from all over the synod and beyond engage in ways that foster growth, encourage conversation, provide mutual support, create community beyond difference, and ultimately connect one's faith in day-to-day life. 





Eugene Peterson's *The Message* presents the Great Commandment this way: "Love the Lord your God with all your passion and prayer and intelligence." I need passion?
